

# International Partnership Ceremony is a College-Wide Effort

Thomas Edison State College and the University of South Africa (UNISA), one of the largest distance learning universities in the world, are partnering to develop two joint degree programs and other college-level learning opportunities for adult students throughout the world.

The formal signing ceremony, which took place in Thomas Edison State College's Prudence Hall on May 16, was the culmination of a coordinated effort by staff from across the College community. P. Henry van Zyl, PhD, vice provost of the Center for Directed Independent Adult Learning, along with Lois Richardson, PhD, dean of the School of Arts and Sciences, and Marcus Tillery, PhD, dean of the School of Applied Science and Technology, played a key role in developing the new partnership with UNISA.

The Office of the President, under the supervision of Esther H. Paist, executive assistant to the president and secretary to the Board of Trustees, coordinated arrangements from the delegation's arrival on Sunday, May 14 through Wednesday, May 17, and developed the overall agenda for the delegation's visit to the College. Linda Vasbinder and Beverly Dash played a key role assisting Paist in these efforts. John P. Thurber, vice president for Public Affairs, also graciously provided transportation for the delegation to and from the College and other events.

"It was great to meet and work with the members of the UNISA delegation as we put together the agenda for the time they were here in Trenton," said Paist. "They are wonderful people! I was also so impressed with our own Thomas Edison State College staff and the way everyone worked so hard and so well to make the signing ceremony and other official events a great success."






### Focus on: Michelle Robinson





This coming December, Robinson will mark her ninth year with Thomas Edison State College. During that time, she has fostered collaborative relationships that extend beyond the College to the surrounding community. In addition to her work in the Office of Learner Services, Robinson donates her time and talents to many College events and community outreach projects. She has assisted with Commencement since 1999, coordinated the College's school supply drive from 2003 to 2005 and continues to coordinate the AFT toy and charity drives and scholarship awards. Robinson also volunteers her skill in wrapping eye-popping gift baskets for Alumni and Foundation events and plays a fundamental role with the College Foundation Gala's Silent Auction.

The new partnership focuses on the joint establishment of two baccalaureate programs: a Bachelor of Science in Energy Utility Technology degree, which is being developed and coordinated by Dr. Tillery; and a Bachelor of Environment degree, which is being developed and coordinated by Dr. Richardson. Through the partnership, the institutions will also share resources and expertise in the development of online courses and assessment models as well as collaborate on joint research programs on pedagogy and using communication technologies in distance learning.

"We're from different hemispheres and different cultures, but we share a commitment to providing high-quality programs for adult learners," said Dr. George A. Pruitt, president of Thomas Edison State College. "This partnership will give our students access to some of the finest course materials in the world and will enable UNISA students to take advantage of new degree programs relevant to both South Africa, and the entire African continent."

UNISA is a comprehensive, open learning and distance education institution with a student body of more than 250,000 students. Dr. Pruitt noted that continuing the College's relationship with UNISA is important as the university positions itself as an international leader in distance education programs.

"As post-apartheid South Africa continues to rebuild, we want to ensure our partnership can assist the development of the new South Africa," he said.
