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

Latest Phase of Mobile Learning Initiative Launched

Thomas Edison State College has launched the latest phase of its Mobile Learning Initiative with a new course delivery system that enables students to access 20 online courses with any Web-enabled cell phone or other mobile device.

The courses, known as Mobile Option *e*-Pack® courses, enable students to use smartphones to download and complete diagnostic quizzes in preparation for a final

OutStart Hot Lava created a conversion tool for the college that enabled them to flow quizzes instantly into mobile-compatible language, he said.

exam. The courses utilize the OutStart Hot Lava Mobile platform, distributed by OHE Associates, which gives students access to the quizzes using a Web-enabled cell phone or mobile device.

connectivity," said Dr. Henry van Zyl, vice provost of Directed Independent Adult Learning at Thomas Edison State College.

Dr. Van Zyl said the College selected OHE Associates and the OutStart The College's Mobile Learning Initiative was initially launched last spring with the release of its FlashTrack courses, which are delivered to students on a single two gigabyte (2GB) flash drive. Students who registered for the initial FlashTrack courses did not need an Internet connection to complete the course and prepare for pass or fail final examinations.

The initial phase of the Mobile Learning Initiative was made possible with funding from the Thomas Edison State College Foundation.

The next generation of FlashTrack courses will have a similar structure as the College's online courses, but will enable students to complete course work in an offline setting without the need for a constant Internet connection.



The School of Nursing Earns CCNE Accreditation

The School of Nursing at Thomas Edison State College was recently awarded accreditation by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE). The initial, five-year accreditation resulted from a rigorous onsite evaluation and assessment of the School's curriculum conducted in November 2008.

"Earning the CCNE accreditation

The accreditation process provided a chance for students and graduates of the program to share their experiences – as both nursing students and active practitioners – with CCNE evaluators.

"The School of Nursing offered everything that would make my life bearable," said 2009 graduate Geri Sanfillippo, RN, BSN, a nurse at Recognized by the U.S. secretary of education, CCNE is the principal accrediting body for nursing schools and the only national accrediting agency devoted exclusively to evaluating bachelor's and graduate nursing education programs. The CCNE accreditation includes the RN to BSN/MSN program offered by Thomas Edison State College.


Capital Health System in Trenton, N.J. Yekeen Odewale, RN, BC, MSN, said the College provides nurses with the type of program they are looking for.

ackie Williams can tell you about the advantages of constantly being on the move for your career. She can also tell you how the demands of a civil service job make it difficult for an adult student to complete a college degree.

Fortunately, Williams had the fortitude to stay focused on her studies as she moved around the country – and the world – while advancing her career and raising her family.

"I have worked for the federal government since 1980, and entered civil service while working on my associate degree," said Williams, who earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in 1986. "During that time, I moved repeatedly while advancing my career in accounting and finance. Thomas Edison State College suited my needs perfectly at a time when no other college could."

Williams said Thomas Edison State College enabled her to transfer credits earned at her community college and through the College-Level Examination Program (CLEP).

"The College's counselors were caring and provided information in writing and by phone," she said. "After receiving my associate degree in 1980, I was so thrilled with the experience that I continued toward my BA, while working and raising a family."

During her years at Thomas Edison State College, Williams said she maintained a belief that perseverance would produce great results.

"When I graduated from high school in 1969, there weren't the opportunities that exist today. I worked during the day in New York City and attended community college at night on a part-time basis, while living with my parents and brother. Colleges were structured for traditional students and I've never been a traditional student."

After graduation, Williams went on to earn a Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree in financial management at Webster University in Colorado. She also earned Certified Government Financial Management certification (CGFM) while working for the federal government in Ohio, and earned a Certified Fraud Examiner certification (CFE) while living in northern Virginia and working as a consultant to federal agencies. She has also taught International Finance and English as a Second Language as an adjunct.

"Thomas Edison State College has so much to be proud of," said Williams. "I can never begin to thank the men and women of the College, during their years of assistance and presently, as I recommend the College's programs to friends who I hope will enjoy it as much as I have."

Williams and her husband, Steve, currently live in Fredericksburg, Va.

First Graduates of the Master of Arts in Educational Leadership Are Ready to Lead



Michael Mendes did not need a salary. He just wanted to help kids.

For Mendes, it started when he worked part time as an assistant football coach at Monsignor Donovan High School in Toms River, N.J.

"I found out that what we were doing on the field was helping the kids in their lives," recalled Mendes. "It went beyond sports. I loved doing it so much that I did not need a paycheck. It was just an awesome feeling and I decided that I needed to make it my career."

So he did. About a year after Mendes earned a bachelor's degree from Monmouth University, he left the field of sports marketing to become a teacher. In 2002, Mendes joined New Egypt High School in New Egypt, N.J., as a business and technology teacher. He continued coaching in the district, and also took on administrative tasks, including public relations coordinator and student information systems coordinator.

"I started to realize that as an administrator, I could actually help students and teachers," said Mendes.

Mendes started to pursue a master's degree at Kean

University, but his hectic schedule made it difficult to manage his graduate work. At the same time, the school district was experiencing administrative changes and Mendes knew timing was critical to positioning himself for a potential opening.

"I was teaching full time, coaching three seasons of the year and running out of time to pursue my master's degree," he said. Mendes was a member of the first group of students to complete the Master of Arts in Educational Leadership degree in May 2009. On July 1, he started his new position as assistant principal of New Egypt High School.

"If it was not for Thomas Edison State College, I do not know if I would be here in my new position at this time," he said.



It was at this point that Mendes learned about the Master of Arts in Educational Leadership degree program at Thomas Edison State College. Mendes was able to transfer the graduate credits he earned at Kean University and complete his master's degree at Thomas Edison State College without sacrificing his professional responsibilities.

"At Thomas Edison State College, there was much more interaction with classmates in our online courses than with classroom-based courses," he said. "There was also more one-on-one interaction with the professors."

Professional growth is a key inspiration for many students in the Educational Leadership program.

Major funding for the Master of Arts in Educational Leadership degree program came from a \$180,000 grant from the Martinson Family Foundation, which supported course development and creation of a program director position. The Martinson Family Foundation supports educational initiatives that strengthen the effectiveness of K-12 schools, particularly in the areas of math and science. The foundation was founded and is

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College Hosts TEAC Accreditation Site Visit

The Heavin School of Arts and Sciences at Thomas Edison State College hosted a site visit for accreditation of the Master of Arts in Educational Leadership degree program by the Teacher Education Accreditation Council (TEAC) on May 10-12.

TEAC is dedicated to helping educator-preparation programs improve and be accountable for the quality of their curriculum. As part of the accreditation process, students and mentors of the Educational Leadership program provided feedback to the team regarding their experiences with the program.

The Master of Arts in Educational Leadership degree program serves adults who wish to prepare for roles as school leaders. The program is offered completely led by John Martinson, managing director of the Edison Venture Fund, who is a national leader in the venture capital industry and an information technology expert.

John Thurber, executive vice president of the Thomas Edison State College Foundation, noted the importance of this grant. "The Martinson Family Foundation provided the support that enabled the College to prepare the next generation of leaders for our K-12 schools."

Additional funding for the program came from a \$75,000 grant from the Thomas Edison State College Foundation.

Sarah Finley, a biology and chemistry teacher and head of the Science Department at Gloucester City Junior-Senior High School in Gloucester City, N.J., said she enrolled in the program to position herself for a move to administration when the time is right.

"I'm not ready to leave the classroom yet, but getting

into administration is now an avenue that is available to me," she said. "I have a very strong interest in developing curriculum, so that could be my future focus."

Finley, who earned her bachelor's degree from LaSalle University, has been a teacher for 12 years. She selected Thomas Edison State College's master's program after a

thorough search and on the recommendation of her mother, who is also an educator and Thomas Edison State College graduate.

"After a long day in the classroom, I liked that I did not have to drive across town and sit in another classroom for hours," she said. "It was nice to wake up on a Sunday morning and be able to do a paper."

Graduates of the program said the online interaction enabled them to share common experiences as educators that enhanced the program itself and provided a dynamic that most classroom-based programs built around lectures do not offer.

online and aims to promote an understanding of educational leadership and administration through a process which is based upon the national Interstate School Leaders Licensure Consortium standards.

"Many of our underlying circumstances and experiences were common, regardless of the differences in our ages or where we work," noted **Cheryl Chadderton**, who has served as a kindergarten teacher and literacy coach in New Jersey's Paterson school district for 12 years. "I was able to ask my classmates about things they were doing with their students and share what we are doing in Paterson. We got to know each other as teachers and as students."

Chadderton, who earned her bachelor's degree from

Kean University, started a new position in September at the district's 14th Avenue Early Learning Center. As an academic support teacher, she will support teachers in the district with literacy training and professional development and also work with students.

"I would like to eventually get into administration, especially in the area of literacy," she said. "My new credentials will also be helpful in my new position this school year, both in the classroom as well as with teachers and parents."

efore taking his first exam at Thomas Edison State College, Abraham Goldenberg already knew that he had the capacity for intensive study.

While studying the Talmud, a 36-volume set of ancient rabbinical writings, he mastered the demanding, analytical skills required to grasp the complexity and breadth of the early Jewish texts.

In 2008, Goldenberg decided to focus his analytical skills in a different direction and set his sights on becoming a certified public accountant.

"I had some prior education, but nothing in the field of accounting," he recalled. "To get a CPA license, I needed a bachelor's degree and an in-depth knowledge of accounting to pass the Certified Public Accountant (CPA) exams."

Goldenberg wanted to complete his degree in the most efficient and cost-effective manner possible.

"I wanted to earn my degree as quickly as possible without breaking the bank and I wanted to get right to the core area of study by clearing everything else out of the way as quickly as possible," he said. "I knew it would have to be online, as I don't like sitting in class, and I would rather learn independently. I shopped around at about a dozen colleges before I heard about Thomas Edison State College. I knew right away that the College was the place for me. There are so many ways to earn college credit, including transferring credits, Prior Learning Assessment and testing."

After Goldenberg applied and received an academic evaluation, he realized that he needed 66 credits to satisfy his accounting degree requirements. He was pleased to discover that he could complete 45 of those credits via examination programs, such as the College-Level Examination Program (CLEP), Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Educational Support

(DANTES) and the College's TECEP® program.

Through testing, Goldenberg earned his bachelor's degree in about seven months.

"I gained a very in-depth knowledge of accounting by taking those courses online, which is exactly what I wanted," he said. "As I studied for the CPA exams, I found that I had already covered much of the material through the courses I had taken at Thomas Edison State College."

Goldenberg passed the final section of the CPA exam in early June. In early July, the Institute of Internal Auditors (IIA) informed him that he had met the criteria to become a Certified Internal Auditor.

Goldenberg is now keenly interested in the investigative aspects of the field.

"I have spent years sharpening my analytical skills, and I think I have an affinity for this particular area," he said. "I took the CFE exams (Certified Fraud Examiner) in February, and I just need accounting experience to become fully certified. I don't know any other place that would have made it possible to fulfill my dream in so short a time. I am extremely thankful to Thomas Edison State College for giving me the opportunity to get where I wanted to go."
