

Regardless of how Commencement is described, it is one of the best opportunities for the College to form a lasting impression on graduating students.

Does the College love Commencement? Yes indeed, and Registrar **Sharon Smith** along with Commencement captains officiated a pep rally of sorts during the September Lunch-N-Learn to count the ways.

From 'ADA' to 'VIP Seating', the imposing list of assignment categories confirmed the necessity for a College-wide commitment to provide the best experience possible for graduates the day of Commencement. Smith's visual presentation, which included moving quotes from grateful grads and photography of Commencements past, was augmented by presentations from team captains.

"It is the most important day of the year for us and there is a direct relationship between the success of this event and the growth of the College," said Smith, who is qualified to make such a statement. "This will be my 8th Commencement as registrar. I previously worked 17 years in the Office of the Registrar assisting with the event. My duties ranged from student cap and gown distributor to platform party team captain."

This year, 175 College staff and six mentors joined nearly 400 graduates from 28 U.S. states who converged on the N.J. State Museum, Kelsey Townhouses and the Soldiers and Sailors' War Memorial during the College's 36th Annual Commencement. "It was the highest attendance we have ever had

College Goes Global and Attracts **More Than 100 Prospective Students** to Virtual Admissions Fair

Thomas Edison State College has long been a leader in leveraging technology to serve adult learners. Aiming this expertise toward prospective students, the College recently facilitated an online admissions information session which attracted participants from as far away as Zambia, South Africa.

Contracting with WebEx Communications, Inc., a company specializing in Web conferencing and collaboration, the College's Office of Learner Support hosted the inaugural Virtual Admissions Fair in August. According to David Hoftiezer, director of Admissions, "This exciting initiative goes beyond the walls of the College in reach-

ing a large group of people and leverages technology to assist the prospective students in higher education choices. Because of its success, Thomas Edison State College will continue to host virtual admissions fairs throughout the year."

The Office of Learner Support staff stationed themselves in the Kelsey Townhouse computer lab on the evening of Aug. 20, to facilitate the hour-long Webinar, which enabled the kind of interaction usually associated with face-to-face presentations. Similar to standard admissions fairs held throughout the year, this Web-based seminar provided prospective students with a convenient way to learn more about the admissions process. Questions were fielded on an array of topics such as earning credits through Prior Learning Assessment, areas of study, degree choices and financial aid.

School of Professional and Continuing Studies Earns "Excellence in New Programming" Award

The School of Professional and Continuing Studies recently received the UCEA (University Continuing Education Association) Mid-Atlantic Region's Excellence in New Programming Award for a customized training program it has developed. The School was honored at UCEA's awards dinner and ceremony at the annual conference on Oct. 5.




The School created the award-winning training program for PROCEED, Inc.: The National Center for Training, Support and Technical Assistance. PROCEED is a capacity-building organization based in Elizabeth, N.J., and funded in part through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The School developed and delivered a blended human resources (HR) overview course for 21 professionals who direct HIV/AIDS-prevention education programs throughout the country. The pilot project included program directors who possessed considerable counseling education and experience, but little or no human resources training. The course was introduced in a two-day onsite program, which was followed by a customized online component that placed the program directors in online modules for additional training and support. Program directors facing similar HR issues in agencies around the country formed a community of learners to develop their HR skills. PROCEED has contracted with the School for a second cohort later this year. In addition to recognition by UCEA, the program has drawn the attention of the CDC in Atlanta, whose program director has called the partnership with Thomas Edison State College "groundbreaking" and "pioneering."

"In very large measure, the success of the program is due to the leadership and tireless efforts of Assistant Dean **Barbara Eklund**, who organized, developed and delivered the program," said **Dr. David Grossman**, vice provost and dean of the School of Professional and Continuing Studies.

Is Your Outlook Profile Up to Date?

Did you know you can request an update of your Microsoft Office Outlook E-Mail profile? According to Associate Director of MIS **Seth Aronson**, "to correct outdated personal information in Outlook, simply submit a Help Desk ticket and select from the following dropdowns: Department: 'MIS,' Topic: 'E-mail/Outlook' and Sub Topic: 'Update Global Address Book.' You can request a change to your title, department, office location or phone number. The information will be confirmed with the Office of Human Resources before being finalized." Check your current information by opening your MS Office E-mail, click on the address book icon and choose your name. Once your name is highlighted, right click and select "Properties." You should see a window similar to the one pictured to the right. Confirm that all the fields are correct. If they are not, submit a Help Desk to have the information revised.
