## **Professor Robert T. Quade**



Guided Study faculty mentor Bob Quade has traveled to over 30 countries during his academic and business careers, but few places could compare with his recent trip to the Philippines where he addressed students and faculty at the University of Santo Tomas in Manila.

"I found the people of the Philippines to be the most delightful, most gracious people that I have ever met," Quade said, reflecting on his visit. They were attentive, courteous and down to earth. I was treated royally." In fact, as luck would have it, Quade's visit to the University of Santo Tomas coincided with a rare celebration attended by many VIPs.

The University of Santo Tomas, the largest Catholic University in the World, was celebrating a Eucharistic Congress, which included many religious leaders and dignitaries. Quade was included in many of the celebrations. "It was an unbelievable experience to be traveling with this group at this University with so much history and tradition."

Quade was invited to the University to speak with students and faculty on the topics of global economy and market research. He spent several days in Korea and the Philippines. He is looking forward to an upcomina visit by a group of Philippine students who will be spending time at Centenary College. where, for the last 11 vears. Quade has been the Business Division chair and teaches Statistics and Marketing. Prior to his association with Centenary, he taught at Rutgers for eight years and Fairleigh Dickinson University for 13.

His entire career has been marketing oriented.

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



## Dr. Henry van Zyl

The newest member of the DIAL team has come from halfway around the world to join Thomas Edison as an instructional designer. "Why not?" Dr. Henry van Zyl, stated, "Change is good and my family and I are always looking for a challenge." And Thomas Edison was looking

for a person with Dr. van ZVI's extensive expertise in the area of distance learning to work in its growing program.



Born and educated in South Africa, Dr. van Zyl most recently directed an initiative at the University of South Africa (UNISA), the Teachina Development Project, that is working to change the way faculty view teaching and to develop the skills and curriculum needed to facilitate a new team approach.

"About four years ago, the UNISA came under sharp criticism for its antiquated teaching methods. We were losing students and for the first time found ourselves being criticized by watchdog agencies respected by the educational community," Dr. van Zyl recalled. As director of Instructional Desian, Dr. van ZvI was charged with changing the attitudes of faculty who were used to teaching independently and moving them to a team approach in course design — no small task.

"I met with the most incredible resistance but also with the most fabulous cooperation," Dr. van Zyl recalls. Some faculty felt threatened and resisted change; others welcomed new ideas and felt challenged. "We worked to initiate a cultural shift among faculty that changed their view from 'teaching people' to one of 'helping people to learn," he continued.

Dr. van Zyl credits much

of the success of the project to the dedicated team of instructional designers, editors and araphic artists he directed. "Together, through workshops, seminars, oneon-one discussions and extensive meetings, we got people on board and made a major impact," he believes. The University continues to conduct followup and in-depth evaluation to confirm that students are

really doing better The University of South Africa is one of the 10 mega-universities of the world, with enrollments of more than 100,000. It has approximately 130,000 students who study entirely at a distance and more than 4,000 faculty. Dr. van Zyl earned his Doctor of Education there; his research focused on "A Didactic Model for the Use of Computer Technology in Distance Education."

Dr. van Zyl first heard of Thomas Edison in 1992. when he came to America on a study tour. His primary interest at the time was exploring how technology could be used to serve students with disabilities. In 1993, he and Esther Paist, director of distance learning programs at Thomas Edison, co-delivered a paper on that topic at the International University Consortium

(IUC) Conference in Maryland. True to form, these distance education professionals had never met and had prepared for their joint presentation "at a distance," meeting in person for the first time the day before the conference. Last year, Dr. van Zyl and a team of UNISA faculty presented a workshop on instructional design at the annual IUC Conference.

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Dr. van Zyl is excited to be working at Thomas Edison, and believes the potential for growth in distance education is enormous. Although he and his family tried to move here with no preconceived notions or expectations about the United States, he has been most pleased with the people who have been "so friendly, welcomina and supportive."

"Dr. van Zyl's international perspective and his well respected knowledge in distance learning pedagoay make him a perfect fit for Thomas Edison's new technology initiatives. Dr. van Zyl will play an important role in leading the College's distance learning efforts with faculty and in course development. We are all very pleased and excited to have him join the DIAL team," stated Associate Vice President William Seaton.

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

#### Course Profile .... FROM P. 1

Focusing on selected locations around the globe, Human Geography shows students the impact that government, corporate, group and individual decisions have on communities and their inhabitants. From tourism in Borneo to Singapore's economic strides to issues of land use in Alaska, the underlying causes of dateline news events are examined. Other issues include the rapid globalization of the media, Berlin as a changing center of a changing Europe and global firms in the industrializing East. What emerges from the specific cases are the broad social patterns that shape our lives.

The course uses James Rubenstein's best-selling textbook, The Cultural Landscape: An Introduction to Human Geography. This 16-week course requires six assignments and two examinations. There are no prerequisites, and it is available each semester.
