At the Office of Management Information Systems' (MIS) Lunch and Learn on July 8, staff learned that the myEdison® portal is the place to go for everything Thomas Edison State College (TESC). From paystubs to Parature to policy information, it can all be found in one place.

the portal homepage is announcements, a place where staff can view any important information or upcoming events. The site also has links to all College forms, applications, email and much more."

And, he added, "Although at this time, you have to log in twice to access other specific sites, such as Ceridian and SoftTime, the long-term goal is to have these sites become integrated into a Single Sign On

The portal homepage will load on any browser and offers easy access to all applications at work, home or on the road. Once logged in, staff can access College email, submit SoftTime requests, review calendar information or, for fun, check out the pictures of the day. Additionally, there are links to College publications, offices and departments, and TESC blogs.

All of the College's forms are located in one section and an organizational chart is viewable as well. A section devoted to staff discounts from vendors such as Apple and Verizon Wireless can be found on the main page of myEdison®, as well as a link to the College store where staff can purchase Thomas Edison State College merchandise at a 10 to 15 percent discount.

The "Group Site" section is a forum that allows staff to create an access-restricted online committee of select members, which permits all participants with proper credentials to share information.

"There are many possibilities for this online portal and we encourage staff to suggest enhancements that will make their quest for information and documents effortless," Stoll noted.

College Pilots eBooks in Nine Popular Courses

The College is offering students the option of free electronic versions of their textbooks (eBooks) in nine popular courses during the October 2015 term. During the pilot phase, College staff will be gathering data on student usage of eBooks.

"We will be tracking the number of students who utilize this option and monitoring their preferences while the pilot is underway," said **Dr. P. Henry van Zyl**, dean of Graduate Programs and vice provost for Academic Administration, whose office is overseeing the project. "We are happy to extend this opportunity to students for a limited time. The eBooks are environmentally friendly, more portable and their usage eliminates the customary wait for paper textbook delivery at the beginning of each term."

Focus On: Deborah Ware

I also appreciate the fact that after a number of years I've had the chance to work in a variety of different departments and to learn so many aspects of TESC," Ware said.

Not only does Ware know what it's like to be an employee of the College, she also knows firsthand the experience of being a student. She earned both an AA and BA degree from TESC. "As an employee of the College, I very much enjoyed the opportunity to complete a second associate's degree as well as a

The golf classic is held annually in memory of former colleague and TESC staff member Thomas C. Streckewald.



With October designated as National Cybersecurity Awareness Month, here are seven tips you can deploy to help keep you and your information secure online.

- Be mindful of what you share on social media. Hackers can befriend you and easily access information, including where you work and when you're away on vacation.
- When creating your password, use a strong mix of characters, symbols and numbers, and avoid using the same password for multiple sites.
- Back up your information regularly, and assure that your anti-virus software is up to date.

- ► If you need to leave your device unattended for any length of time, be sure to lock it so that no one can use it while you're away.
- ▶ Be attentive when clicking on attachments or links in an email. Double check the URL of the website the link takes you to. Hackers will take advantage of common spelling mistakes to direct you to a harmful site.
- Be meticulous of what you plug in to your computer. Viruses can be unknowingly spread through flash drives, external hard drives, and smartphones.
- Monitor your accounts for any suspicious activity, keeping an eye out for unusual charges.
