

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

# Thomas Edison State College Celebrates 29th Annual Commencement



The fall is traditionally a time to contemplate new beginnings at Thomas Edison State College.

On Saturday, Oct. 13, 2001, a beautiful crisp and blue-skied day, 185 graduates convened at the War Memorial in Trenton, NJ, to collect their hard-earned degrees during the College's 29th annual commencement ceremony.

Represented among them were graduates with a wide array of professions, lifestyles and educational needs. Common among them was a successfully completed goal: earning a college diploma.

It was a day filled with laughter, smiles, tears, hugs and high fives, as graduates, before a standing-roomonly audience of family and friends, took turns accepting their degrees.

It was also a day marked by a moment of sadness, when Dr. George A. Pruitt, president of the College, presented a diploma to the widow and sons of Joseph John Pycior, Jr. (see photo, bottom left). Mr. Pycior would have earned a BA in history and become a middle school teacher, had he not died in the terrorist attack on the Pentagon on September 11th.

#### .High Honors

The Doctor of Humane Letters. honoris causa, was awarded to five recipients this year: Chief Roy Crazy Horse, for his outstanding contributions to his own Powhatan Renape Nation and society in general; Dr. Jerry T. Ice, for his outstanding contributions to higher education, Thomas Edison State College, and its staff, students and alumni; Maurice T. Perilli, for his outstanding contributions to the business and civic communities, and for his dedicated service to Thomas Edison State College; Deborah T. Poritz, for her outstanding contributions to the legal community and to the citizens of the State of New Jersey; and Urban G. Whitaker, for his outstanding contributions to higher education, and his dedicated service to Thomas Edison State College.

"These are honors that the College does not bestow lightly," said Dr. George A Pruitt, president of Thomas Edison State College. "Each year, we search long and hard for individuals who personify the ideals the institution stands for, and the kind of adult learners we serve.


"It was an honor to have these five fine individuals join us at our commencement ceremony," said Dr. Pruitt. "Their hard work and dedication stand as further proof of the power of education. I'm certain our graduates, and our guests, were inspired by their lifelong achievements."



#### Chief Roy Crazy, Horse

Chief Roy Crazy Horse is the executive administrative director of the Powhatan Indians of Delaware Valley. He is also the executive director of the Coalition of Eastern Native Americans. He has distinguished himself as a leader of and role model for the Powhatan Renape Nation, working unceasingly to educate his own people and others about the rich cultural heritage of the Powhatan Renape Nation and about Native Americans, in general.

Chief Roy Crazy Horse developed the first Indian family counseling service in New Jersey and is a founder of the New Jersey Native American Cultural Center. A respected author of books and articles on Native American issues, Chief Crazy Horse has taught in the Indian Studies department at Rowan State College and lectured at various colleges and universities throughout the Middle Atlantic States.



#### Jerry Ice

Jerry Ice has recently been appointed executive director of the Graduate School, United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), in Washington, D.C. As executive director, he oversees the work of the Graduate School's 18 business units, its National Independent Study Center, and its Leadership Development Academy.

Before taking on his duties at the Graduate School, Dr. Ice served Thomas Edison State College for 18 years as Vice President and Provost, the College's chief academic officer. He is the architect of the College's current academic programs and degree offerings. All the academic policies and procedures that have served our students and the College so well bear his stamp.

Dr. Ice came to Thomas Edison State College from Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP), where he served as associate provost and dean, School of Continuing Education and The Graduate School. Prior to his appointment to IUP, he held several administrative positions at Montclair State University in New Jersey.

Dr. Ice received his Ed. D degree in Administration and Supervision from Fordham University. Many of his publications and presentations have focused on the educational needs and goals of adult learners, the primary population Thomas Edison State College serves. During his tenure at Thomas Edison State College, a number of programs have been implemented, including the National Institute for the Assessment of Experiential Learning, collaborative relationships with all the community colleges in New Jersey, and joint ventures with the University of South Africa, US Open University, and several institutions outside the state.

#### In Remembrance...

Joseph John Pycior Jr. Aviation Warfare Systems Operator First Class United States Navy Oct. 14, 1961 – Sept. 11, 2001



Career Navy man Joseph Pycior Jr. was about

to embark on a new path: middle school history teacher. Described by his family as a lifelong lover of U.S. and military history, Mr. Pycior studied evenings from home to earn a BA in history from Thomas Edison State College. He would have been eligible to participate in the College's Commencement Ceremony in October 2001.

On Sept. 11, 2001, Mr. Pycior's dream came to an abrupt halt, when a commercial airliner commandeered by terrorists crashed into the Pentagon, killing Mr. Pycior at the scene.

His high school sweetheart and wife of 15 years, Terri, and their two sons, Joseph III and Robbie, attended Commencement to receive his degree.

The US Navy enthralled Mr. Pycior when he was still a child. Before he turned 10, Mr. Pycior was a member of the Naval Bridge, a youth organization where he learned the honor and integrity of military rules and regulations. While a student at Becton Regional High School in East Rutherford, NJ, the Carlstadt native joined the Naval Junior Reserved Officer's Training Corp.

Mr. Pycior graduated from high school in 1980, and promptly enlisted in the US Navy. He was only 17, and needed parental permission – which was willingly provided – to join.

Mr. Pycior served his country on a number of ships, including the USS George Washington and the USS Seattle. During Desert Storm, Mr. Pycior was stationed in the Persian Gulf.

Mr. Pycior began working at the Pentagon in 1999. He lived in Landover, MD, and planned to move his family back to New Jersey in early 2002, after retiring from the Navy.

Mr. Pycior was a very involved and loving husband and father. He enjoyed his role as Cub Scout Den Leader for his son, Joey. His wife remembers that scouting allowed him to be carefree and fun loving with his sons.

In addition to his wife and sons, Mr. Pycior is survived by his father, Joseph John Pycior, Sr., a US Navy veteran, and his mother, Arlene Pycior. A brother, Gregory James Pycior, a US Army Veteran, died in 1990.

Ronald John Hemenway Electronics Technician, First Class United States Navy July 25, 1964 – Sept. 11, 2001

Mr. Hemenway was scheduled to satisfy the requirements for Associate of Science in Applied Science and Technology degree, specializing in electronic studies, from Thomas Edison State College, in November 2002. Two months before he finished, he was killed when a commercial airliner commandeered by terrorists crashed into the Pentagon.

Mr. Hemenway enlisted in the US Navy at the age of 30 and graduated at the top of his class. He proudly served his country on the USS LaSalle; his excellence led to a career at the Pentagon, which allowed Mr. Hemenway to be close to his family.

Hemenway attended Central Texas College before enrolling at Thomas Edison State College in 2001.

The Kansas City, KS, native is survived by his wife, Marinella, and two children, Stefan, 3, and Desiree, 1.

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#### Maurice Perilli

Maurice Perilli is chairman of the board of Roma Federal Savings Bank, where he oversees the operation of the Purchasing Department, the Human Resources Department, Security, and the Building and Property staff. Mr. Perilli is also an active member of the Thomas Edison State College Foundation Board.

Perilli has had a varied and distinguished business career, having been involved in printing and publishing for more than 40 years and having worked in banking for more than 30 years. His civic activities have included service as vice chairman of the Hamilton Township Planning Board, chairman of the Hamilton Township Zoning Board, and police commissioner of Hamilton Township.

Perilli has also served on numerous boards for hospitals, charities, service organizations, and civic and religious organizations. Since December of 1993, he has also been a dedicated member of the Thomas Edison State College Foundation Board, where he has made invaluable contributions to the College and its students.



#### Deborah Poritz

Since 1996, Deborah Poritz has served as chief justice of the Supreme Court of New Jersey.

Chief Justice Poritz received her law degree from the University of Pennsylvania Law School in 1977, at which time she began working for the New Jersey Attorney General in the Division of Law, Environmental Protection Section. Since that time, and before becoming chief justice of the Supreme Court, she has distinguished herself as an attorney and gubernatorial advisor, and as the first female attorney general for the State of New Jersey.

Chief Justice Poritz received her bachelor of arts degree, magna cum laude, from Brooklyn College, where she was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. She then studied English and American Literature at Columbia University and continued graduate studies at Brandeis University. Before pursuing her law degree, she taught composition and literature at Ursinus College.



#### Urban Whitaker

Urban Whitaker has long been involved in experiential learning and career development. He served as practitioner, teacher and administrator in cooperative education and other experiential learning programs at San Francisco State University. He also is emeritus professor of International Relations and dean of Undergraduate Studies at San Francisco State University. He has developed materials in a number of media on prior learning and assessment of career-transferable skills, and is the author of Assessing Learning: Standards, Principles and Procedures.

Whitaker, who holds a Ph.D. from the University of Washington, has consulted for numerous colleges and has performed multiple roles for the Council for Adult and Experiential Learning (CAEL), among them author, member of the Board of Directors, regional manager and presenter. Whitaker was a charter member of the faculty for the Thomas Edison State College Institute of Experiential Learning and Assessment in 1989, and served on the Institute faculty every year since then.

#### Antonia "Toni" Marotta-Brinton

Distinguished Alumnus Award Co-Founder of Lean Line Inc.

An entrepreneur, philanthropist, author and community volunteer, Marotta-Brinton graduated from Thomas Edison State College in 1983 with an Associate of Arts degree. As co-founder and former co-director of Lean Line Inc., she became a noted authority on weight loss and weight control. Now retired from Lean Line, Marotta-Brinton serves on the boards of the Plainfield Health Center, United Family & Children's Society, Henry H. Kessler Foundation and United Trust Bank. Jervis Brinton, Jr., chairman of Brinton Eaton Associates of Morristown, in 1998. The Brintons' combined household consists of five Marotta children and 13 grandchildren, and three Brinton children and five grandchildren.

They don't come much busier than Howard E. Butt, the recipient of the 2001 Outstanding Service to the Alumni Association Award.



Outstanding Professional

JOÃO CRISÓSTOMO

Outstanding Service to Society

Crisóstomo came to the United States in 1975 from Portugal and became an American citizen. In 1992, he received an associate's degree in humanities from Thomas Edison State College.

Throughout his life, Crisóstomo has made it his business to help people and communities. He has accomplished so much as a volunteer that his activities could easily fill a book. One of his greatest accomplishments, though, was a personal crusade to make the world aware of an archaeological site along the banks of the Coa River in northern Portugal.

This archaeological site, a series of rock drawings, was in jeopardy of becoming lost beneath 300 feet of water from a backup reservoir created by a hydroelectric dam. The rock drawings were discovered after construction began; before that, its existence was known only among shepherds, who believed the drawings represented some form of magic.

Crisóstomo founded the Coa Site Movement and enlisted the aid of Congressman Patrick Kennedy, The New York Times, The Times of London and the Secretary-General of the United Nations, all in an effort to make people aware of the rock drawings, which were estimated to be over 20,000 years old.

He succeeded. After many meetings, letters and rallies, and lots of hard work, the Portuguese government abandoned the half-built, \$300 million reservoir, and turned the site into the world's largest Stone Age art gallery.

For Crisóstomo, it was all in a day's work.

"I often feel sad, unable to understand and accept the fact that so few people get involved with helping others. So much can be done," he said.

This award is given to someone who finds a unique way to contribute to society or the community, and leading a campaign to save historical rock engravings certainly qualifies.

Crisóstomo lives in New York and has a son, João M. Jr., 26, and a daughter, Cristina, 29.

## An Athlete, AScholar and An Advocate for Higher Education

It's one thing to find the courage to walk onto a college basketball court, in front of thousands of cheering fans, and block out the thunderous noise to focus on your game.

It's another thing entirely to find the courage to go back to college and succeed as a student. Tack on a decade-and-ahalf away from the classroom, and the accomplishment takes on added meaning.

Mike Davis, recently named head coach for the University of Indiana's men's basketball team, is a man of exceptional courage.

Davis, who earned a bachelor's degree in communications from Thomas Edison State College, said in a recent telephone interview that earning his diploma was a triumph on both professional and personal levels.

"Having a college diploma has made a great impact on my career. When you coach at the college level, you need a degree," said Davis, 40, who nearly two decades ago joined the men's basketball team at

the University of Alabama, where he was awarded a fouryear basketball scholarship.

A standout on the college court, Davis never quite found his footing in the classroom.

"They weren't so strict then about athletes attending classes," said Davis, who left the University without a diploma. "I have a lot of friends who were in my shoes. A lot of them still are."

On a personal level, earning a diploma from Thomas Edison State College was a triumph because it made Davis the first member of his family to graduate from college.

#### A New Man

Since earning his college degree, Coach Davis has become a spokesperson, of sorts, for distance education. He has persuaded many of his former college classmates to follow his lead and go back to school.

One person who has taken his advice is his brother, Van, 43, who recently applied at Coach Davis's alma mater, Thomas Edison State College. Like his younger brother, Van attended college for four years (Jacksonville State in Alabama) and played on the school's basketball team, but didn't graduate.

"We were too young to understand how necessary education is," Davis said. "When you're that young, you think school is not important. They didn't punish you if you didn't go to class. Now it's different. Now the colleges put a stronger focus on athletes studying and graduating."

"And, because no one in our family had completed college, we didn't appreciate the importance of it," Davis said.

Not any more. Now, Davis is a converted man, gladly taking the time to calm the fears of former athletes who are considering a return to college.

"A lot of people out there don't have the courage to go back," Davis said. "They don't know about distance education." "Others have families to support and can't leave home or work, or don't want to be in a classroom with 18-year-olds. But I'm telling them about distance education, and they're listening," Davis said.

Davis spent two seasons playing proball in Switzerland and Italy, before accepting an assistant coaching position at Miles College in Birmingham. He then coached with Wichita Falls and and was a player and a coach for Chicago in the CBA (Continental Basketball Association, which can be likened to baseball's minor leagues), before moving on to Alabama, and finally Indiana, where he started in 1997.

It was during his time with the CBA that Davis first heard about Thomas Edison State College and when an offer came through from the CBA to pay for his tuition, Davis jumped at the chance.

It's a commitment that has reaped handsome rewards.

Recently, after three seasons as assistant coach and one as interim coach, Davis was named head coach of the Hoosiers.

In his first season, Davis led the Hoosiers to a 23-11 record and a runner-up finish in the Big Ten


Tournament, making his the most successful first season of any Hoosiers coach, ever.

Now, Davis makes his home in Indiana with his wife, Tamilya, a high school geography teacher, and their son, Antoine, 3. The coach has two older children, as well: Lateesha, 21, and Mike Jr., 16.

Giving Back to the Community

When the school year ends, Davis' involvement with basketball continues,

but on a different level. While he's quick to point out that many coaches run basketball camps for children in the off season, it's a safe bet that Davis' camp offers a different twist. As someone once wowed by the glories of the sport, Davis knows too well the temptation to ignore one's studies. So while the boys and girls learn the rules of the game, they also learn Coach Davis' Golden Rule: that their studies must always come first.



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#### A Long Road

Born Sept. 15, 1960, in Fayette, Alabama, Davis grew up poor. Through fourth grade, he attended a
