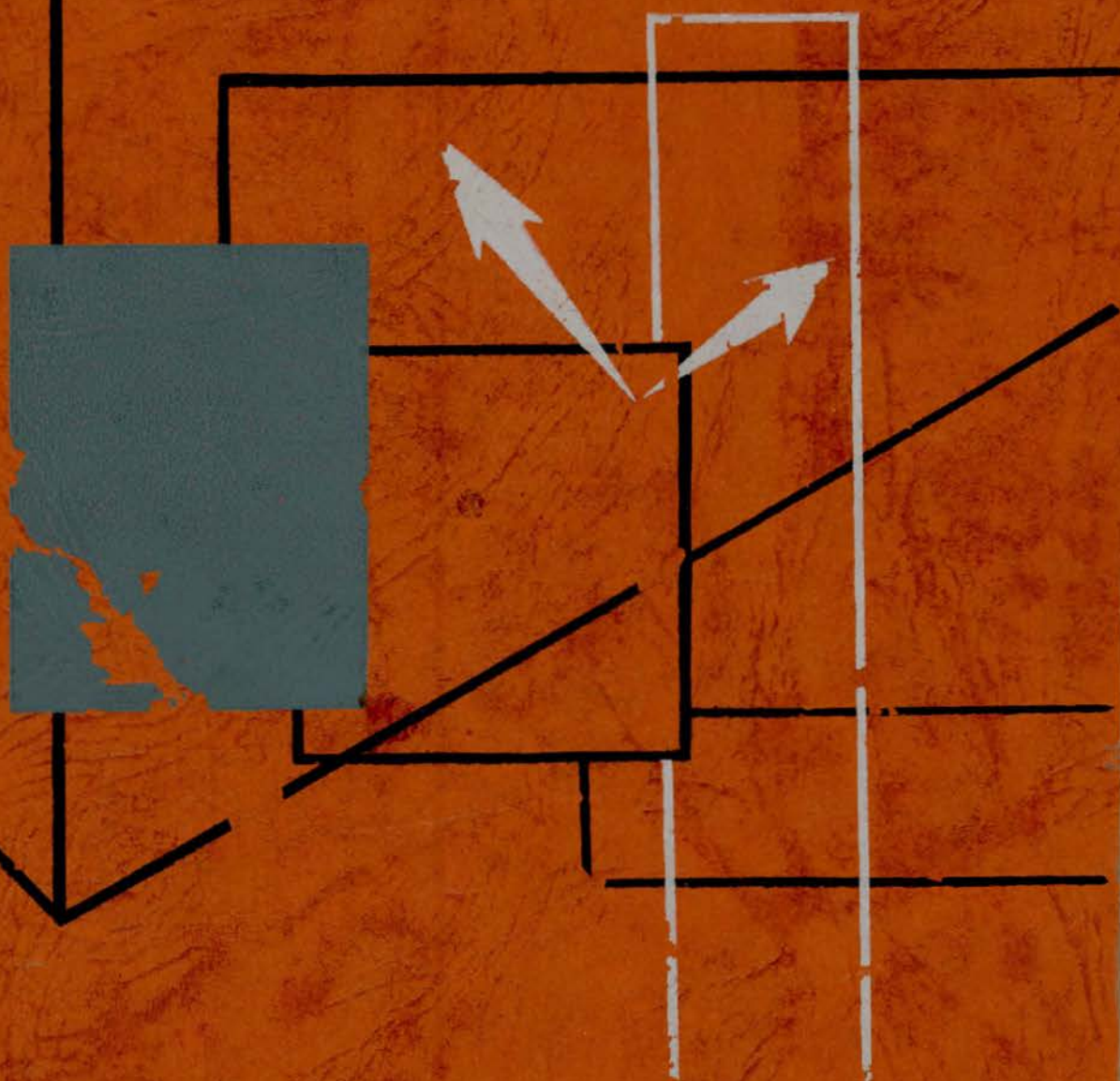

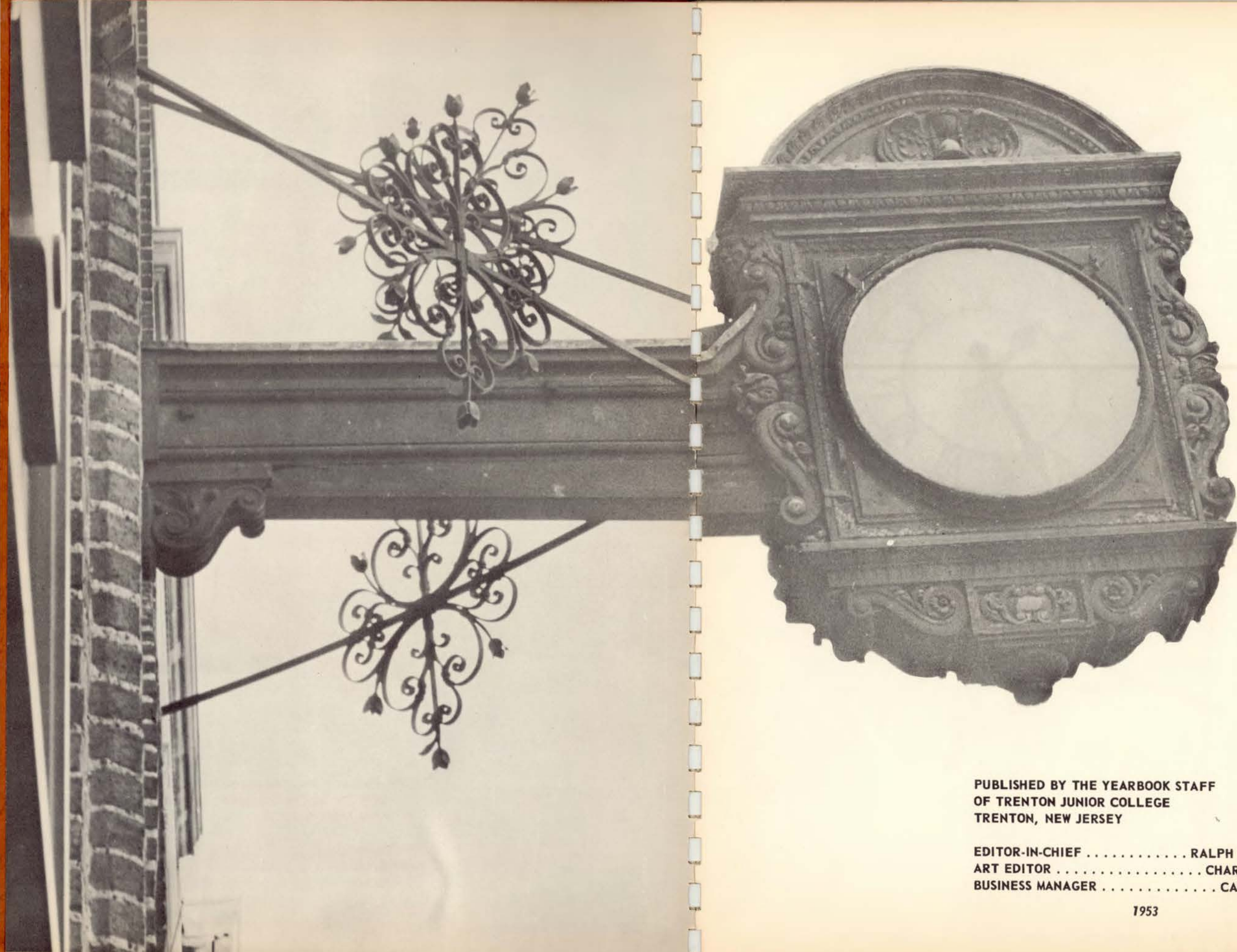

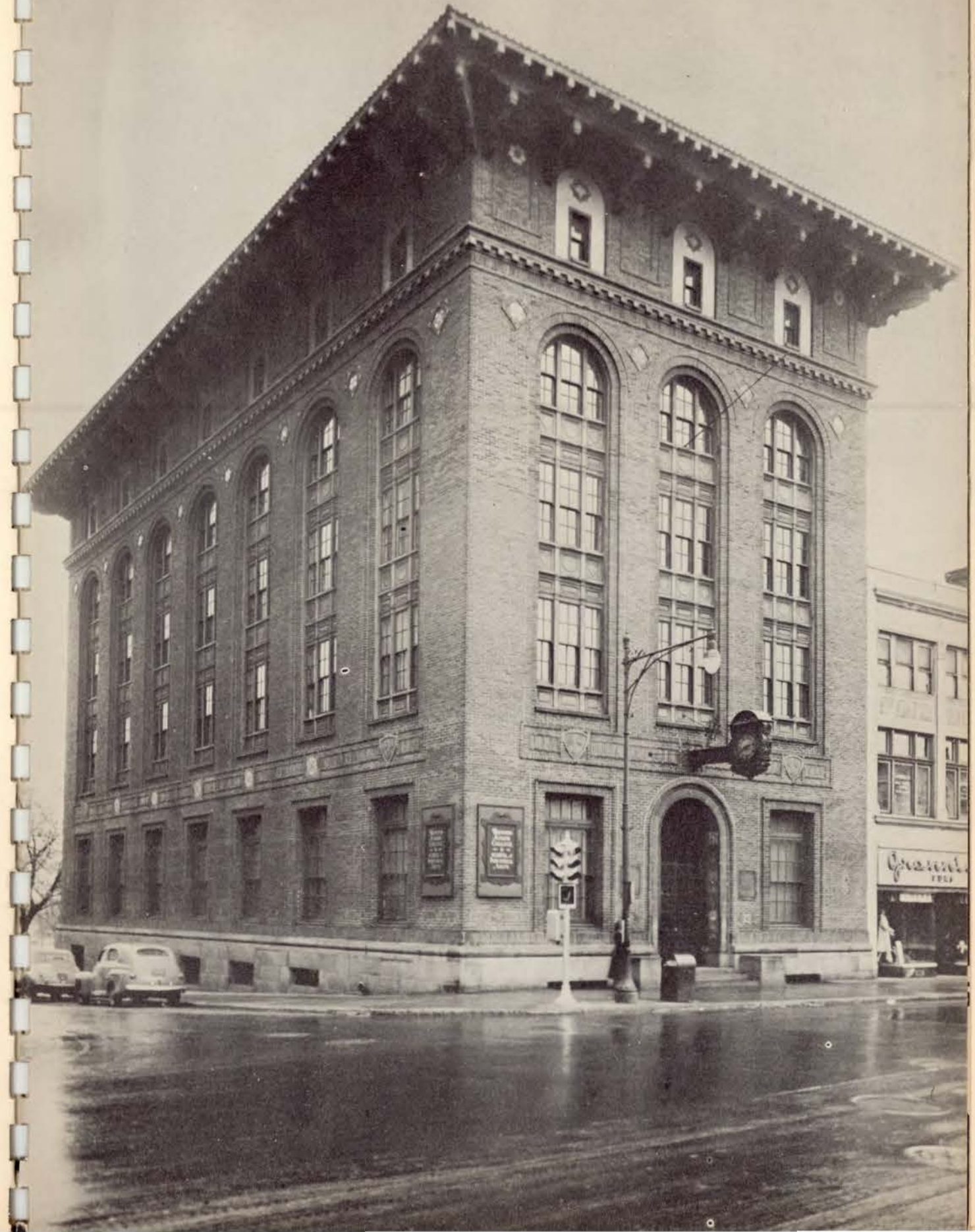

of his experience and knowledge.

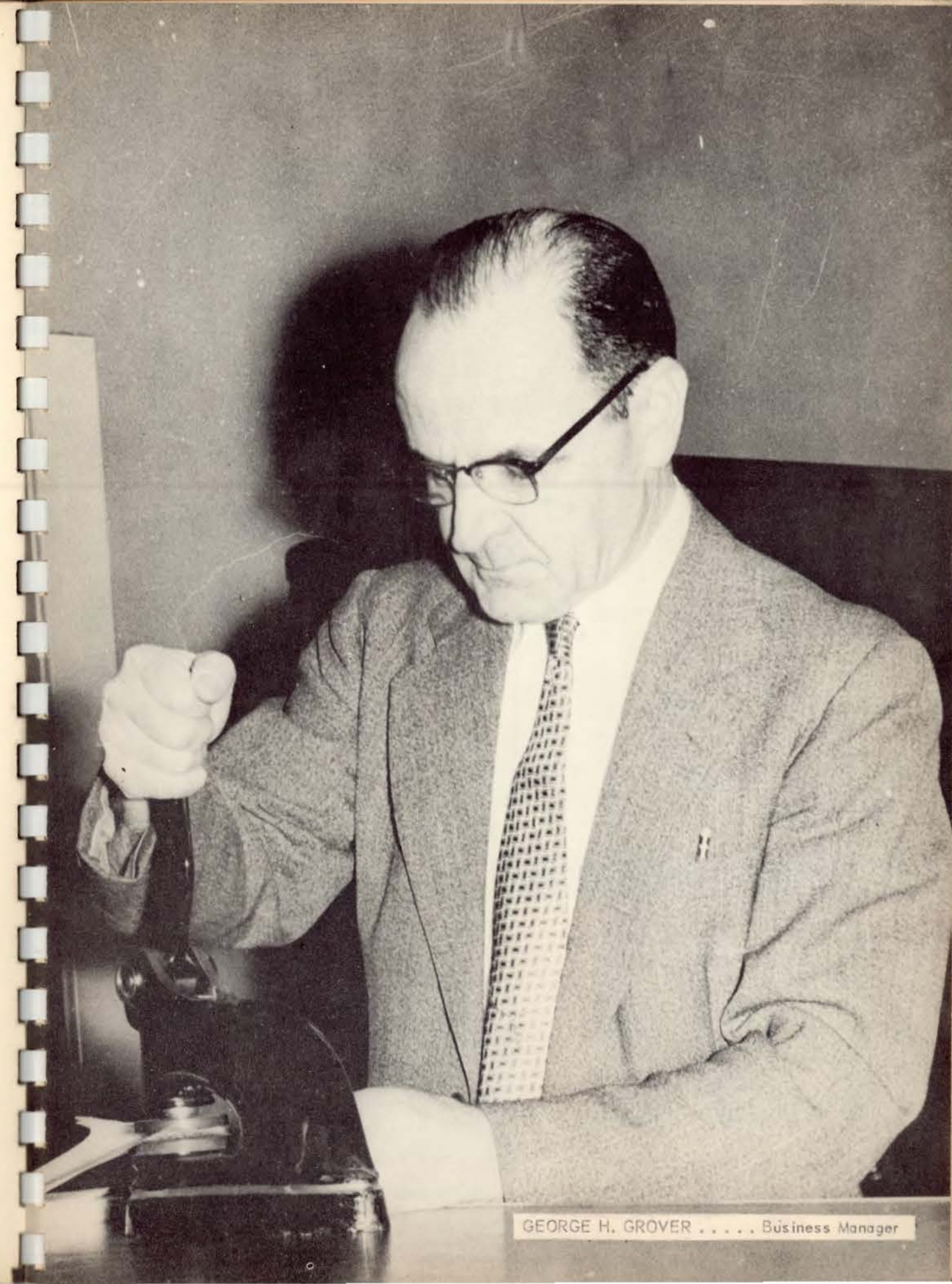

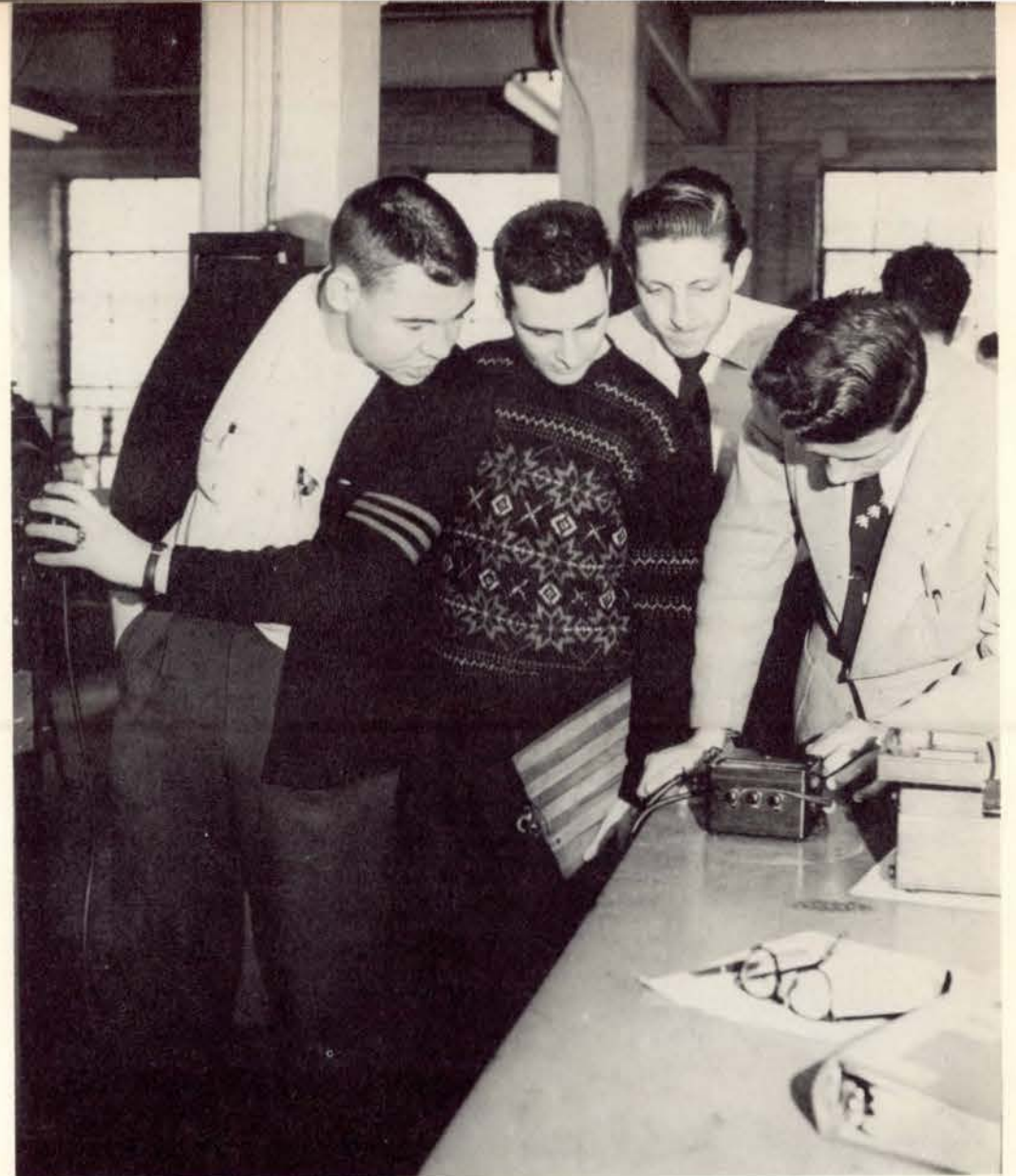

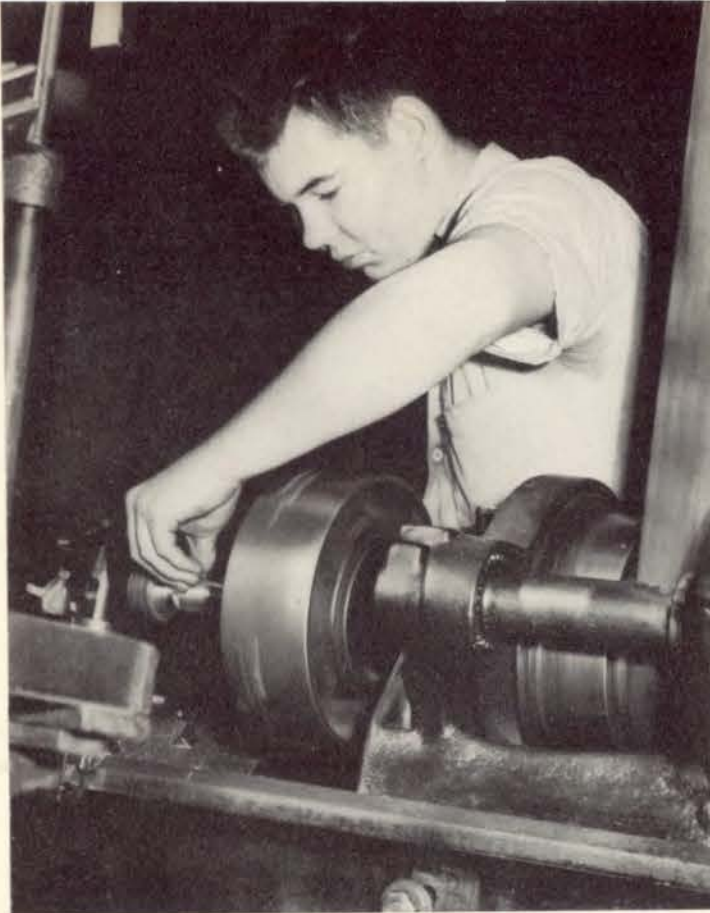

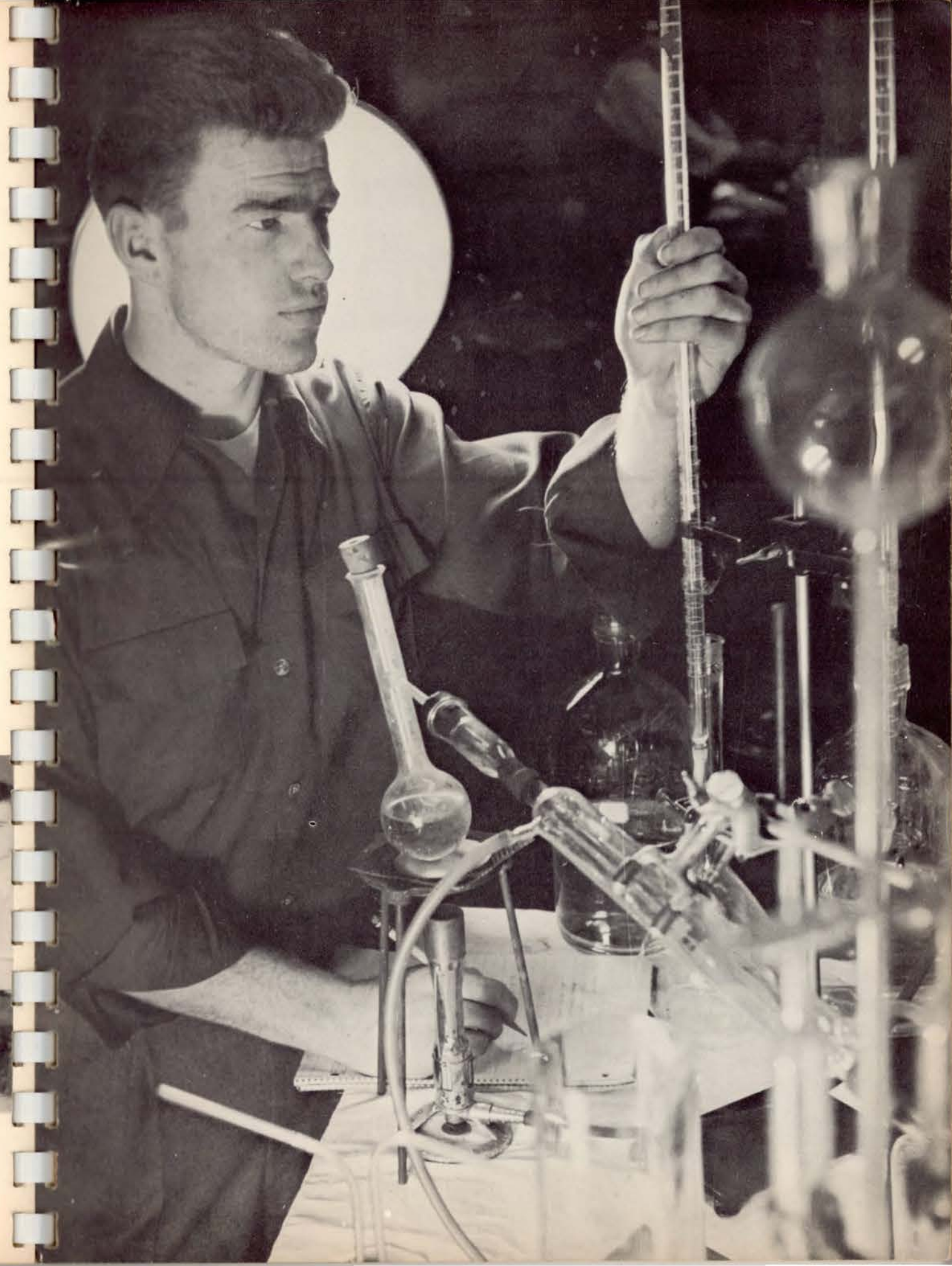

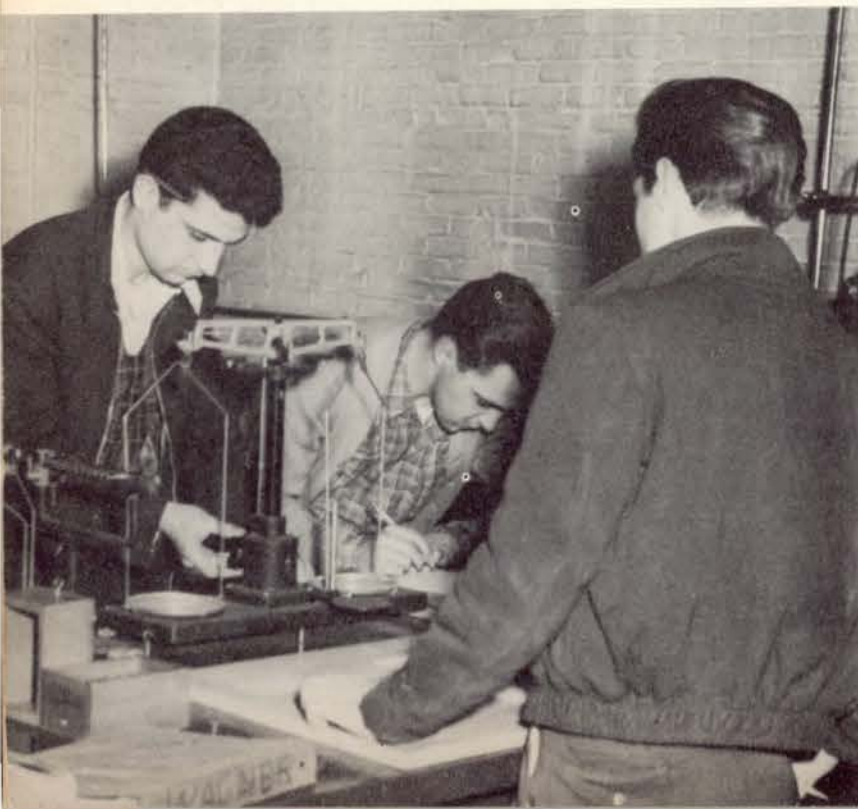

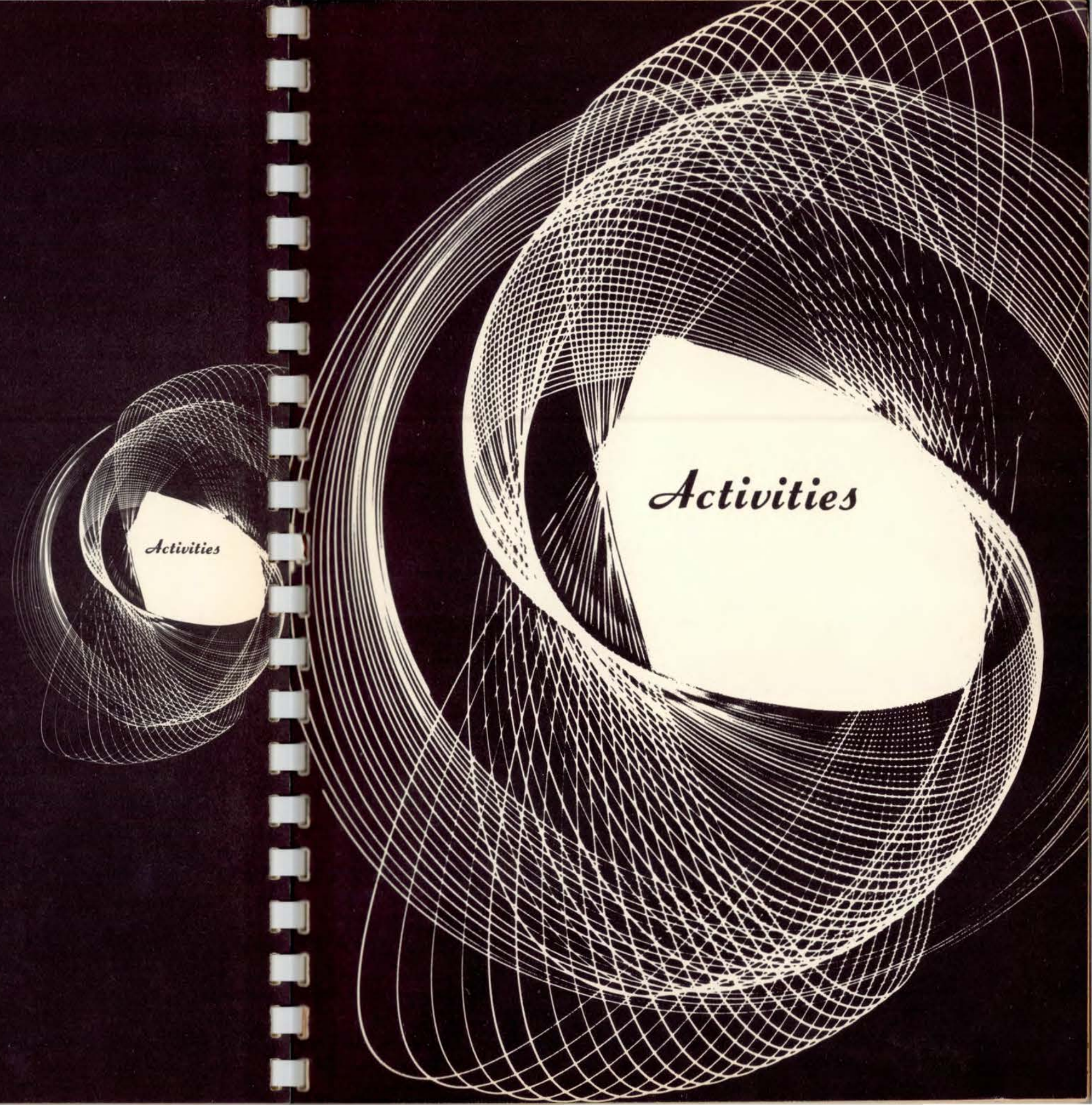

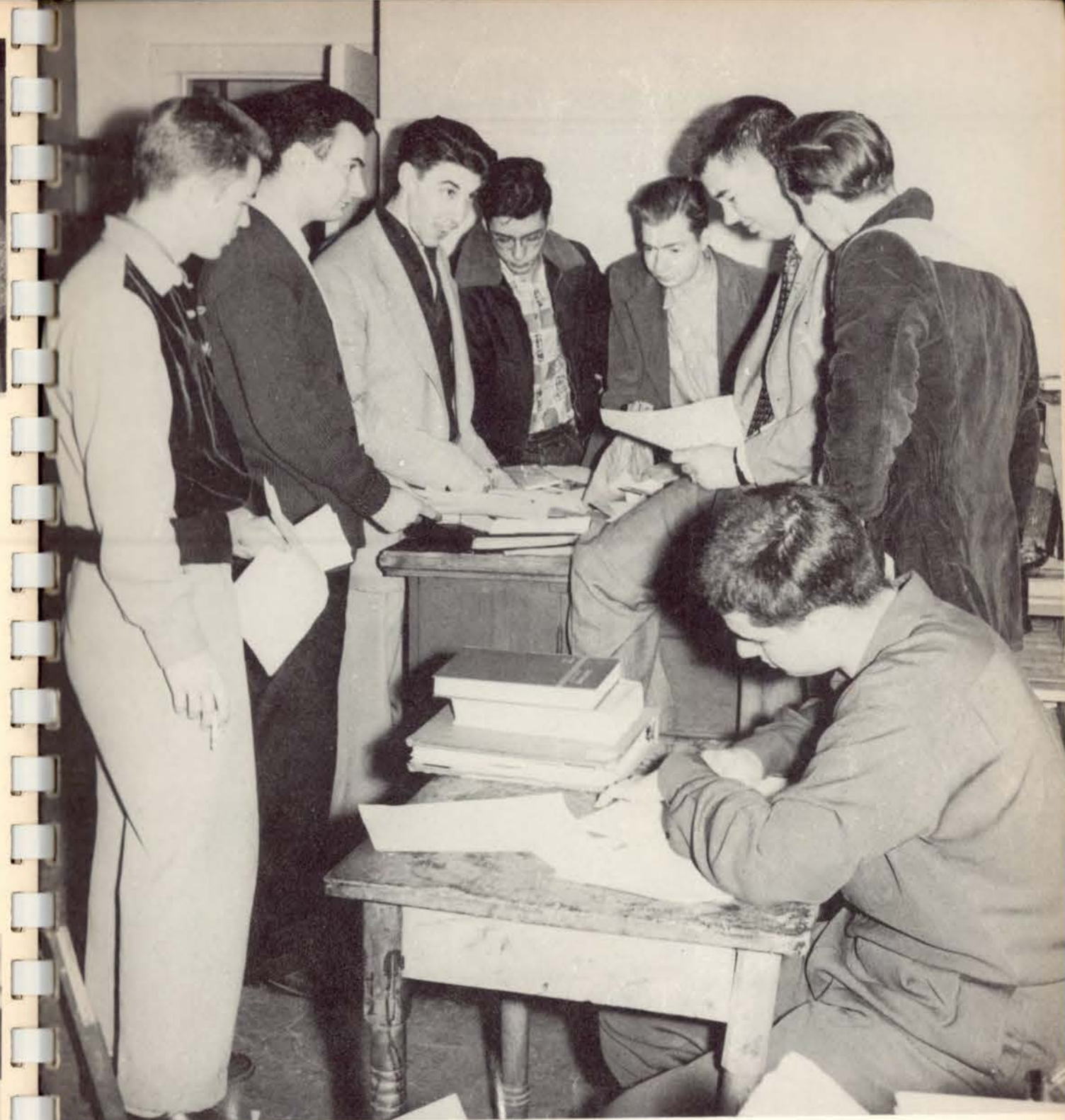

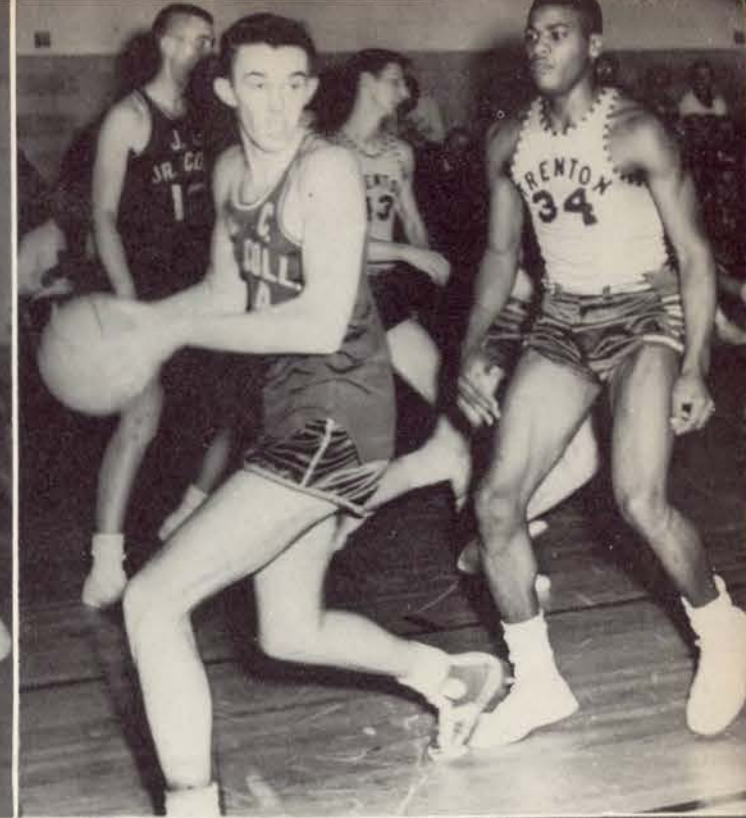
