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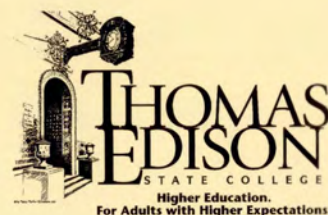

Three College Bachelor Degree Programs Named As “Best Buys” in Higher Education

Three of Thomas Edison State College's bachelor degree programs have recently been ranked among the top best buys in the country, according to national surveys conducted by *GetEducated.com*.

The College's Bachelor of Arts degree in Computer Science, Bachelor of Arts degree in Criminal Justice and Bachelor of Science in Organizational Leadership degree were each ranked as one of the top three best buys in the country for online regionally accredited degree programs.

National surveys conducted by *GetEducated.com* examined publicly posted tuition and fee rates at dozens of regionally accredited institutions that offer online bachelor degree programs. In the areas of computer science, criminal justice and management, Thomas Edison State College ranked third in the nation in terms of quality and affordability for its bachelor's degree programs.

“Online learning allows nontraditional students to attend America's best universities in terms of brand reputation and affordability,” says Vicky Phillips, founder of *GetEducated.com*. “Thomas Edison State College is an undisputed best buy for students nationwide looking for a quality online school with a top consumer ranking.”

According to the surveys:

► The average cost of earning an online bachelor's degree in computer science from a regionally accredited

institution is approximately \$46,758; the average cost to earn the degree at Thomas Edison State College is \$22,586 for New Jersey residents and \$33,280 for non-New Jersey residents.

► The average cost of earning an online bachelor's degree in criminal justice from a regionally accredited institution is approximately \$44,799; the average cost to earn the degree at Thomas Edison State College is \$24,845 for New Jersey residents and \$36,166 for non-New Jersey residents.

► The average cost of earning an online bachelor's degree in management from a regionally accredited institution is approximately \$48,709; the average cost to earn the degree at Thomas Edison State College is \$22,585 for New Jersey residents and \$33,280 for non-New Jersey residents.

The survey results indicate that the cost of earning an online bachelor's degree in computer science, criminal justice or management is well below the national average for online undergraduate degree programs in those areas at regionally accredited schools.

Depending on several factors, including the number of credits a student transfers into a program and the type of tuition plan, the cost of earning a degree at Thomas Edison State College may be even lower.

The award recognizes stellar leadership achievement for educators who have accepted the call to serve as advocates for equal and high-quality public education. Pruitt received the award at the NAACP's Gala Awards Banquet on Sept. 10 in Parsippany, N.J.

“I am honored to receive the NAACP's 2011 Distinguished Educator Award,” said Pruitt. “It is a privilege to be recognized by this renowned organization for my work in public higher education and with the students we serve.”

Pruitt serves as the chairman of the Board of Directors of the Structured Employment Economic Development Corporation (SEEDCO), New York; chairman of the Board of Directors of Capital City Partnership, Inc., Trenton, N.J.; and is a member of the New Jersey Association of State Colleges and Universities (ASCU), Trenton.

Pruitt has been president of Thomas Edison State College since 1982 and is the past chairman of the Mercer County Chamber of Commerce, Trenton, N.J.; a member of the National Advisory Committee on Institutional Quality and Integrity, United States Department of Education.

He has consulted widely in business and government as well as within the higher education community and has served in an advisory capacity to four secretaries of education under three presidents of both parties.

Dr. Pruitt Named to National Commission on Higher Education Attainment

Dr. George A. Pruitt, president of Thomas Edison State College, has been named as a vice chair to a national Commission on Higher Education Attainment, whose goal is to develop a plan to improve retention and attainment at colleges and universities throughout the country.

“I am honored to have been selected to serve on this important commission,” said Pruitt. “Higher education builds the human capital of our country. If we want to compete in the 21st century, improving access, retention and achievement must be a key priority.”

The commission has been created by six presidential educational associations, which nominated the 24-member group. It includes presidents and chancellors from 18 public and private colleges and universities from across the country, including community colleges, research and land-grant institutions, state colleges and universities and independent institutions.

The commission is being chaired by E. Gordon Gee, president of The Ohio State University. The commission also has three vice chairs: Pruitt, the only president from a New Jersey institution named to the commission; Andrew K. Benton, president of Pepperdine University in California; and Gail O. Mellow, president of LaGuardia Community College in New York.

Latest Noncredit Programs Now Available

The John S. Watson School of Public Service and Continuing Studies has recently launched new online noncredit certificates and courses focusing on electronic health records, nonprofit management, general building codes, legal nurse consulting, elder law and healthcare law, which are each built around the unique needs of adult learners.

New Professional Certificates

ELECTRONIC HEALTH RECORDS

The Certified Electronic Health Records Specialist certificate is a 12-month program that provides students with no previous background in electronic health records with the techniques and rationales for using cutting-edge techniques in real-world situations. The program enables students to establish a foothold in the allied health field. Upon successful completion of the program, students will be prepared for an entry-level position in a medical office setting and to sit for the NHA national certification exam to become a Certified Electronic Health Record Specialist (CEHRS).

COUNTERTERRORISM INTELLIGENCE

The Counterterrorism Intelligence certificate is designed for police, government and private security practitioners who are engaged in securing our communities and private sector organizations from terrorist threats. The six-course program focuses on the nature of terrorism, the fundamentals of the terrorist threat and the intelligence process that includes the planning, collection, analysis, retention, dissemination and re-evaluation of relevant information. The program also introduces students to policy considerations, including the legal constraints on intelligence operations in a free society with a specific focus on the PATRIOT Act and the Federal Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA).

New Noncredit Courses

LEADERSHIP THROUGH GOVERNANCE – THE ROLE OF NONPROFIT BOARDS

This six-week course examines the nature of nonprofit boards and the value that they provide to the organizations that they lead and provides an understanding of the many roles played by various parts of the organization and

how the board fits into this structure. Students will learn about the differences between responsibilities and functions, especially as tension between the two impacts the effectiveness of the organizational management model in place. This course is relevant for individuals who are beginning their board term as well those in nonprofit management roles.

GENERAL BUILDING CODE

This eight-week course addresses the use and understanding of International Building Code with special emphasis on the New Jersey building code. The scope of the course encompasses the essential components of the building code and how they are applied to commercial construction. Students learn how to use the code book to find applicable codes and avoid construction code violations likely to be cited by building inspectors. The course content is equally applicable to building inspectors, anyone planning to take the General Contractor Licensing Exam, contractors, construction firms and home builders.

Watson School Dean Named American Council on Education Fellow

Dr. Joseph Youngblood II, vice provost and dean of the John S. Watson School of Public Service and Continuing Studies at Thomas Edison State College, has been selected to participate in a nationally recognized training program designed to strengthen capacity and build leadership in American higher education.

Youngblood will serve as a member of the American Council on Education (ACE) Fellows Program for 2011-2012. Established in 1965, this unique program aims to identify and prepare promising senior faculty and administrators for responsible positions in college and university administration. Youngblood is one of the 50 Fellows nominated by the presidents or chancellors of their institutions that was selected this year in a national competition.

"I am honored to have this unique and exciting opportunity for personal and professional development while also making valuable contributions and building institutional capacity at Thomas Edison State College and my host institution, The College of New Jersey," Youngblood said.

Noted as the only national, individualized, long-term professional development program in higher education, the ACE Fellows Program condenses years of on-the-job experience and skills development into a single semester or year. Of the more than 1,700 participants in the first 46 years of the program, more than 300 have become chief executive officers while an

additional 1,100 have attained senior leadership positions.

An educator and administrator with a background in law, public policy, research and developmental psychology, Youngblood will be mentored by a team of experienced senior administrators at The College of New Jersey during the year-long program. This extended learning experience enables Fellows to observe firsthand how another institution and its senior leadership manages the institution and handles challenges and change.

"Joe's acceptance into the program reflects highly on his potential as an educational leader," said Dr. George A. Pruitt, president of Thomas Edison State College. "We nominated Joe for the program and are proud that he was selected as a Fellow. The ACE Fellows Program is the most effective, comprehensive leadership development program in American higher education today and it is an honor to have one of our senior professionals selected to participate."

The ACE Fellows Program enables participants to immerse themselves in the culture, policies and decision-making processes of another institution. Fellows also attend three retreats on higher education issues organized by ACE, research extensively in the field and engage in other activities to advance their knowledge about the challenges and opportunities confronting higher education today.

Youngblood joined Thomas Edison State College in 2003. He holds a PhD

College Prepares for Launch of Refreshed Website

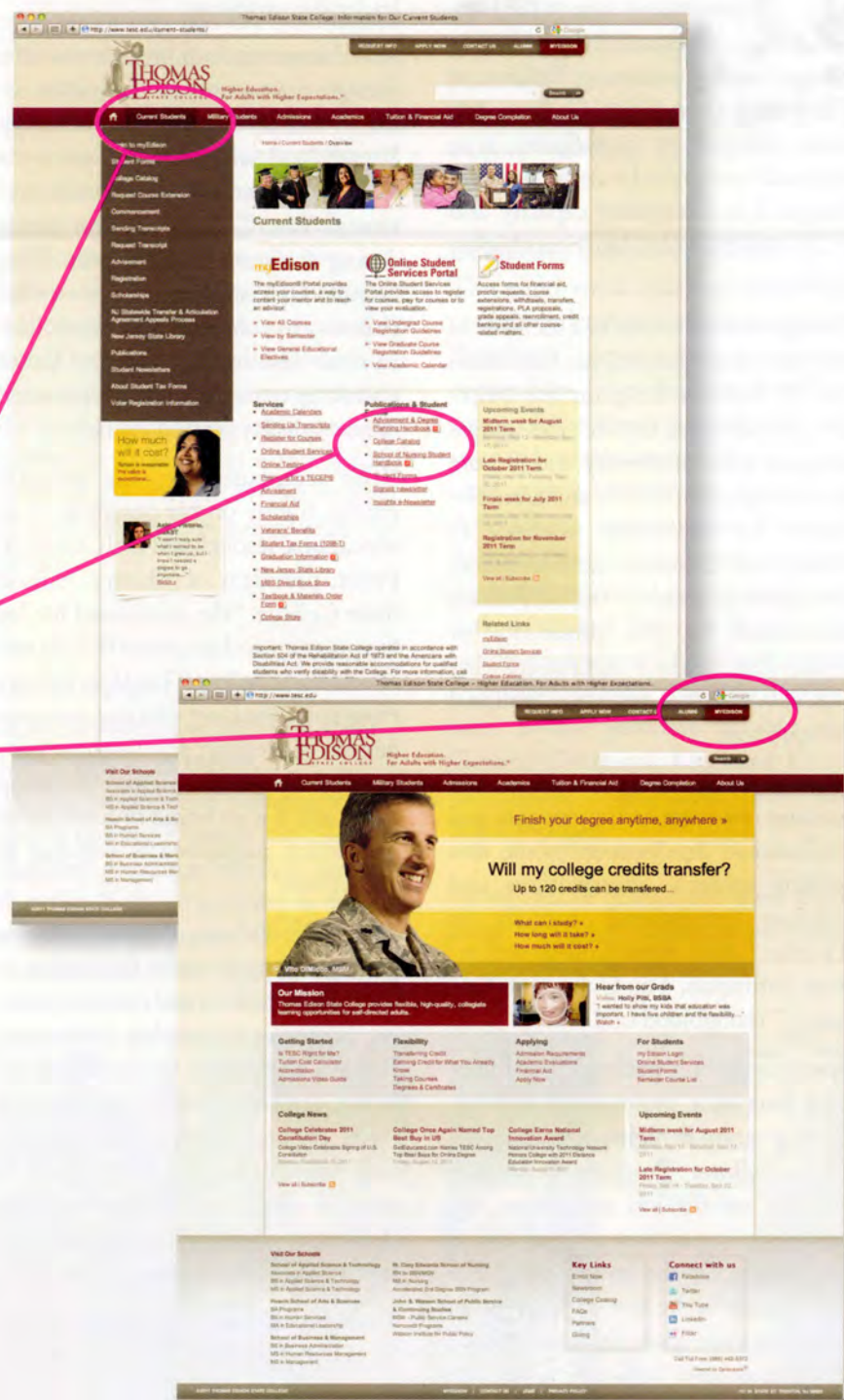
Changes based on Student feedback

Key changes to the website that were recommended by students include:

The School of Business and Management, in partnership with the Heavin School of Arts and Sciences, have developed the Master of Science in Management degree program in School Business Administration. Like most nurses, Soledad G. Dela Merced is a very busy person. As a nurse in the intensive care unit of the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey's (UMDNJ) University Hospital in Newark, N.J., Merced cares for patients in the most serious conditions. She is also an active member of her community and a dedicated wife and mother.

In addition, Merced wanted to become a nurse educator but could not sacrifice time away from her career, her family and community commitments.

“One of the reasons I chose Thomas Edison State College is because it

gave me the opportunity to advance my career in nursing from the convenience of my own home,” said Merced, who received the 2011 Clinical Excellence Award from the Philippine Nurse Association of New Jersey earlier this year.

Flexibility is crucial for working nurses, like Merced, who are interested in advancing their education and one of several key factors in the stunning growth of the College's nursing program, according to Dr. Susan M. O'Brien, dean of the W. Cary Edwards School of Nursing.

In the past four years, undergraduate and graduate nursing enrollments have grown by 158 percent, from 933 in 2008 to 2,405 in 2011. Today, the College has the largest nursing program in New Jersey and one of the largest online RN to BSN (Bachelor of Science in Nursing) programs in the country.

“One reason we have grown so much is because we have such a well-respected brand,” said Dr. George A. Pruitt, president of Thomas Edison State College. “The word-of-mouth in the nursing profession about our

program has been tremendous.”

O’Brien said the program’s growth can also be attributed to internal and external factors that are both critical to offering programs for working nurses.

“Our focus on offering flexible programs, generous transfer credit policies and cost effective tuition has been very important,” she said. “Some external factors are really encouraging nurses to return to school and earn their BSN and we have proven to be a great fit for them.”

One of the leading external factors is the drive for many hospitals to be certified by the Magnet Recognition Program®, an initiative developed by the American Nurses Credentialing Center that recognizes healthcare organizations for quality patient care, nursing excellence and innovations in professional nursing practice and requires hospitals to have two-thirds of their nursing staff possess a bachelor’s degree or higher.

Several studies indicate that increased education of nurses is

related to better patient outcomes, which have led many health systems and advocacy groups to encourage nurses to achieve a baccalaureate-level education.

“Many hospitals now prefer to hire BSN graduates and the way our partnerships work with large health systems in New Jersey has encouraged growth in our program,” said O’Brien. “We enjoy working collaboratively with our partners to increase nurse education in order to improve patient outcomes and the safety of patients. The nursing profession has improved because many more nurses have achieved the BSN, and we are very proud of that.”

The College has several nursing partnerships with New Jersey hospitals, including Capital Health, Kennedy Health, Virtua Health, St. Francis Medical Center and Meridian Health.

The field of nursing faces unique challenges related to both the job market and preparing nurses to enter the field.

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, employment of registered nurses is expected to grow by 22 percent from 2008 to 2018, much faster than the average for all occupations.

In addition, the 2010 report, *The Future of Nursing*, by the Institute of Medicine (IOM), states that nurses in the 21st century will need multiple competencies to deliver high-quality care, such as technical skills and understanding healthcare policy, evidence-based research and information technology. To meet these demands, the report recommends several educational targets for the nursing workforce, including an increase in the number of nurses with a bachelor’s degree.

But a challenge to reaching that goal is a shortage of nurse educators to prepare the next generation of RNs and nurse leaders. According to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN), U.S. nursing schools turned away more than 67,000 qualified applicants from baccalaureate and graduate

nursing programs in 2010, mostly due to faculty shortages.

“The development of our Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) Nurse Educator program in 2006 was based on need,” recalled

Looking back at the growth of the nursing program over the past few years, O’Brien said one of her lifetime ambitions was to help every nurse earn a BSN.

“When I was approached for this

O’Brien. “Our country needs nurses who have a baccalaureate education and today, we do not have enough faculty throughout the country to educate nurses at the BSN level.”

Today, the College’s MSN Nurse Educator program has more than 300 students.

Merced, who completed the MSN Nurse Educator program in 2011, is now a nurse educator with the UMDNJ School of Nursing. She said the program was her first experience at online learning.

“The College guided me and supported me along the way to cross the barriers of technology,” she said. “My mentors were highly educated and very knowledgeable. We had a lot of interactions, which helped guide us through the assignments.”

Following the success of the MSN Nurse Educator program, the College launched MSN programs in Nursing Administration and Nursing Informatics in 2011. Also in 2011, it started the Accelerated 2nd Degree BSN Program, an intense, one-year BSN program for candidates who already possess a non-nursing bachelor’s degree.

SHON BROOKS '98 PLAYS FOR KEEPS WHEN IT COMES TO THE NEXT GENERATION

Even though he is a successful entrepreneur, Fran Shatone Brooks always has time to play games. A premier financial planner and founder and chief executive officer of Brooks Financial & Entertainment Consultants, Brooks has parlayed his successful profession into ventures that promote education, entertainment and empowerment for the next generation.

For Brooks, who is known as Shon professionally, success is more about helping others than about helping himself. In fact, that very attitude has helped his career thrive. For starters, Brooks has developed two 3D games aimed at helping young students better understand finance and the stock market. The first one, a console game called *Save One Bank™*, introduces students to the ins and outs of the world of

banking through an adventurous, hero versus villain action theme. The second game, *Stock Picker™*, is an online game that covers the fast-paced, and often misunderstood, world of the stock market and Wall Street, and the impact it has on the economy. Students can use play money to compete with different classrooms around the country in picking and investing in the most viable stocks.

"With our nation facing a flagging

economy, record deficits, rising unemployment and other economic concerns — situations our kids will likely inherit when they are older — what better time than now to begin teaching students, from elementary to high school, and even college, the importance of knowing how to manage finances," said Brooks, who earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree from Thomas Edison State College in 1998 as well as an Associate in Science in Management degree in 1995.

Brooks is working with San Diego School Districts to release these patented and trademarked interactive games to district schools. His future plans also include marketing the games to other school districts nationally and to the international market.

Additionally, Brooks has donated more than 3,000 books, magazines, calculators and posters to the San Diego Unified School District to encourage financial literacy for youths.

Born in San Diego, Calif., Brooks graduated from Sweetwater High School in nearby National City. Always a high-achieving student, he was allowed to skip from the 9th to the 11th grade, because of his academic ability.

"Even in high school I always had a keen interest in math, business and management in addition to more creative pursuits such as television, theatrical plays and film," he said.

His goal was to combine these elements into a viable enterprise to help others. That dream became reality more than a decade ago when he created Brooks Entertainment Inc., D.B.A. Brooks Financial & Entertainment Consultants, specializing in developing financial, estate and wealth preservation planning strategies for

actors, actresses, broadcasters, musicians, athletes and other celebrities. He also serves as a trusted advisor to others, including lottery winners, on how to make their financial resources yield the best returns.

His firm publishes the *Brooks Financial News*, a monthly online newsletter designed to keep Brooks Financial clients and others updated on the latest in money management.

“Success is not measured only by the monetary rewards you derive from your profession; it is also measured by how you give back to help others in the community.”

Brooks credits Thomas Edison State College with giving him the tools to prosper.

"The College taught me how to finish what I started," he said. "I also learned responsibility and how to remain competitive in an innovating new world. These are the core principles I apply every day in my business."

A true supporter of continuing education, Brooks created the curriculum for two areas of certification for financial planning advisors, which are used by the American Society of Pension Professionals and Actuaries (formerly known as NTSAA Educational Institute). The two certifications are the Certified Retirement Specialist (CRS) and Master Certified Retirement Specialist (MCRS). He also created the exam questions for the certification's Course 1 Study Guide, *The Basics of 403(b) Plans*.

"Higher learning never ends," Brooks said. "So many people believe that once you have received the invitation (to Commencement), you have arrived. That's only the beginning. The true

test of any degree program is if you can apply what you have learned and turn it into something successful. College is preparation for the real thing!"

Brooks has used his success in the financial world as a stepping stone to additional career endeavors to help others, especially through various media pursuits.

He is the creator, writer, producer and

host of the award-winning half-hour TV talk show titled *S.O.B.™*, which motivates and empowers youth toward positive directions in life. The show is currently being promoted on the NFL (National Football League) Network, ESPN, and Monday Night Football through Cox Media, which also interconnects in selected markets on AT&T and Direct TV.

Brooks noted that he is thankful to his father, Lee Oscar Brooks, for discovering Thomas Edison State College.

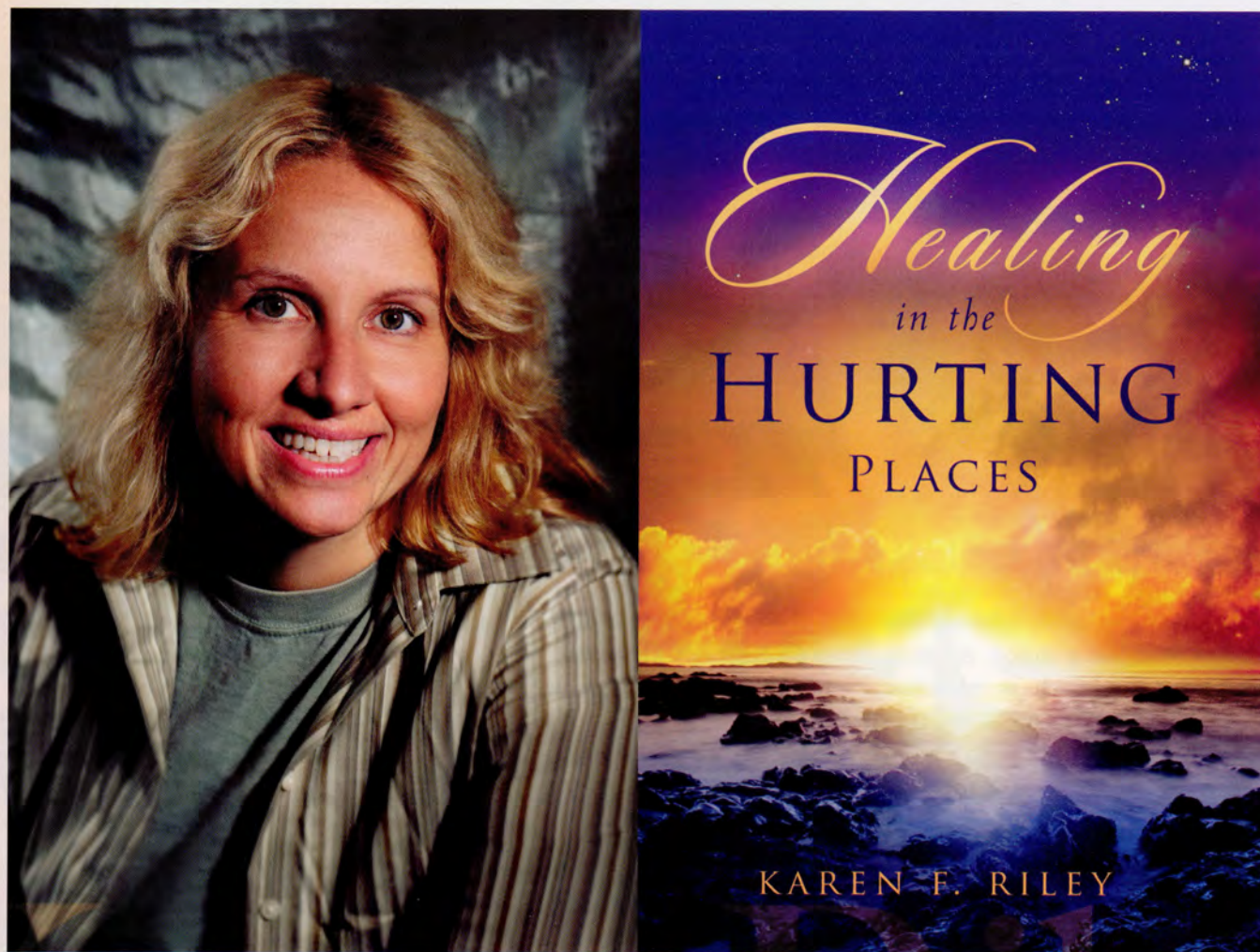

NEW BOOK BY KAREN RILEY '99 HELPS
VICTIMS RECOVER FROM ABUSE



If overcoming adversity makes you stronger, then Karen Riley must be Wonder Woman.

Sexually abused as a child, bullied as a teen and plagued by low self-esteem through most of her life, Riley persevered and survived to become an award-winning author, a successful business owner and an advocate for victims of sexual abuse.

"It has been said that sexual abuse is the only crime in which its victims are made to feel worse than the criminal," said Riley. "So I drove myself to excel – convinced that if I was successful, and if I could be someone that others would look up to and respect, then I would not be that dirty, abused, unloved child I saw in the mirror each day."

Riley was a gifted student who graduated second out of more than 500 students in her Brooklyn high school and earned academic scholarships to colleges. But by her

find hope – first, as part of her personal redemption and then by helping others.

"No college degree meant no advancement," said Riley, who learned about Thomas Edison State College when she was taking classes at Ocean County College in Toms River, N.J.

Riley, who earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree in 1999, transferred her community college credits to Thomas Edison State College and said she immediately discovered the College's unique programs were an excellent match for her.

Her latest book brought Riley out of the woods and onto a more personal endeavor. Published in 2011, *Healing in the Hurting Places* tells Riley's personal story and provides resources for victims of sexual abuse and people who want to help victims but do not know how.

"I had never planned on sharing my story publicly, but 'Healing' is an inspirational story that emerged from my own recovery and is designed to enlighten and offer hope to those suffering from sexual abuse," said Riley. "I am a big believer in education. I feel that enlightening people about what abuse does can help them to recognize someone who is hurting and in need."

In addition to writing, Riley is a co-owner of KFR Communications, LLC, a graphic and website design company that specializes in branding identity which serves start-up companies, international organizations, nonprofits, churches, ministries, government agencies and schools.

Riley and her husband, Bill, have been married 31 years and live in New Egypt, N.J. They have three children: Lisa, 29; Laura, 26; and Christopher, 23. They also have a new granddaughter, Lilyana.

"My degree belongs to my family," noted Riley. "My family was very supportive of me while I was studying. I would like to think that it rubbed off on my children, as they have all become highly disciplined adults who are adept at juggling different aspects of their work, school and family lives while successfully maintaining a balance."

"While I strived academically, I was a loner with poor social skills and was bullied horribly because of it," recalled Riley. "I wanted nothing more to do with classroom life and plunged immediately into the work force."

After working for 17 years in seven different fields, Riley said she reached a certain point where work experience no longer mattered. Ironically, it would be through education that she would

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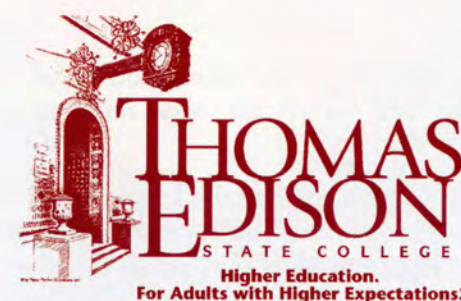
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Sheera M. Dashkow BSAST '07
