Mancini appointed new Chief of Staff of Thomas Edison State University

homas Edison State University President Merodie A. Hancock, PhD, has named Michael Mancini as chief of staff of the institution.


"I am extremely pleased that Michael has joined the University's leadership team as my chief of staff," said Hancock." His track record of working across divisions, setting strategy and, most importantly, driving student success will make him a valuable addition to this special institution."

Prior to joining Thomas Edison State University on May 21, Mancini served as chief of staff at SUNY Empire State College. In his new position, he serves as the primary advisor to Hancock and works across divisions to help set and implement the institution's strategic direction. "I am excited to be a part of Thomas Edison State University, New Jersey's flagship institution for adults, as it enters a new era," said Mancini. "The University is a national leader in higher education, and I believe strongly in its mission. I am appreciative to President Hancock for putting her faith in me, and I am enjoying my new role of serving the students, staff, alumni and mentors of TESU."

As a member of SUNY Empire State College's cabinet, Mancini was an integral part of the leadership and operations of the college. He joined SUNY in 2008 and served as director of community and government relations before his appointment as chief of staff in 2014. Among his key initiatives, Mancini co-led the college's strategic planning process, which was completed in January 2018.

Mancini earned a Bachelor of Arts in History from SUNY Purchase and a Master of Education from the University at Buffalo. He is a Balanced Scorecard Professional, obtaining his certification through the Balanced Scorecard Institute, in conjunction with The George Washington University College of Professional Studies.

Active in SUNY, state and national higher education organizations, Mancini is a former member of the board of directors for the State University of New York Council on University Advancement (SUNYCUAD). He received the Excellence in Professional Service Award at SUNY Empire State College in 2012 and SUNYCUAD's "Best in Category" award for his congressional lobbying efforts.

Mancini reflected on the bright future of adult higher education at the University.



"TESU is at a very exciting time. Adult education is changing dramatically and no institution is better situated to embrace this period of innovation than Thomas Edison" said Mancini. "I know that through the leadership of President Hancock and the University's dedicated employees, we will build on our past successes and be an even greater University for our current and future students."

Mancini, who grew up on Long Island, and his husband, David Mancini, who is originally from Buffalo, share their home with three pets: two dogs, Huck, a Husky mix and Lila Mae, a Yorkie; and a cat named Zoe.

Focus On: Judy Lucas

Family is very important to Judy Lucas, assistant to the Chief of Staff and the General Counsel, and she has found that 'family' can be a very broad term.

Lucas, who began her career at Thomas Edison State University in 1994 as a secretary in the Office of Administrative Services, left in 2000 to have her second child and returned three years later to serve as confidential assistant to the vice president for Administration and Finance, before moving to her current position in 2016.

"I truly enjoy the people here at the University," Lucas explained. "I have worked here for many years and I feel like I am part of a family.

"I was not familiar with the University when I applied here for a position that was advertised in the newspaper, but I am so glad I did," she added. "I enjoy working here. I am devoted to our mission: helping adult learners obtain their degrees. I have made many friends and enjoy working with my co-workers and learning so much from them."

Lucas' various duties include keeping the chief of staff informed of all inquiries and requests from University staff, external constituents, various businesses and students.

"I provide administrative support to the chief of staff, which includes preparing materials for our Board of Trustees' meetings, correspondence, scheduling and daily administrative duties," she noted. "I also provide administrative support to the general counsel, and I am the central point of contact for processing ethics forms. And, I provide support to the president's assistant."

Family life outside of work is equally rewarding.

Lucas has been married to husband Rich, a finance manager at Haldeman Ford/Subaru, for nearly 26 years. They have two daughters, Jessica (23) and Jenna (18). Jessica is working on her master's degree in occupational therapy. Jenna is graduating from high school this year and will go to a New Jersey community college for two years before continuing at a state school to get her bachelor's degree in nutrition. The family also shares its Bordentown, N.J., home with a 14-year-old Yorkshire terrier named Jazmine.

On the home front, family also includes the community.

"Bordentown is a great town, and I have great neighbors. There are only 25 homes in my development, and we get together very often for social events - dinners, parties and picnics."




