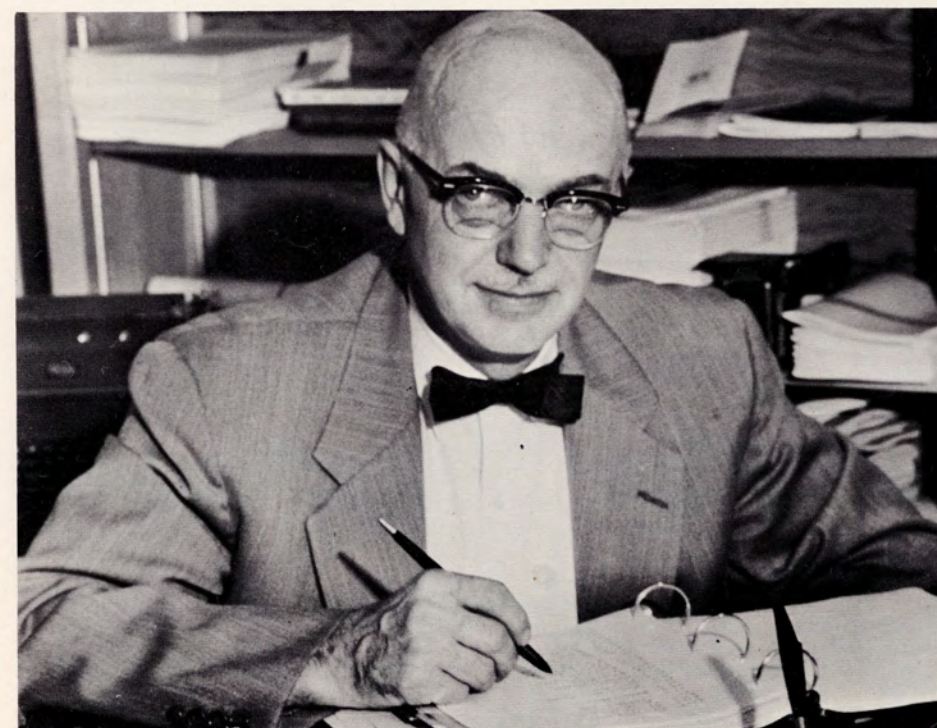

You responded by concerning yourself with the election of the right representative to come to the Student Government and with your support of our social functions.



COMMENCEMENT and BACCALAUREATE

On June 18th, at 4 p. m., the 1961 graduating class of Trenton Junior College will hold its Commencement Exercises in the War Memorial Building.

The Reverend Doctor Joseph MacCarroll of Norristown, Pennsylvania, will give the sermon to begin the program. Musical selections will then be provided by the Glee Club. The Invocation prayer will be given by the Reverend Carl R. Nagele of the Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church. Benediction is to be given by the Reverend S. H. Woodson.

Immediately following the Baccalaureate Services a buffet supper will be held for the graduation class and their parents or guests. The traditional buffet will again be served this year, allowing each student to take two guests.

Commencement Exercises will start at 8 p. m. The guest speaker will be Mr. Raymond F. Male, Mayor of Princeton. Professor J. Gordon White, the Grand Marshal, will head the procession. On the platform will be the guest speaker, Mr. Male, Dr. Henry Parcinski, President of T. J. C.; the Board of Trustees; Dean Lloyd A. Carver, and Dr. John Perry Pritchett. The Glee Club will again perform and Miss Patricia Boenig will sing a solo for both exercises.

The closing prayer will be given by the Reverend Henry M. Tracy, Principal of Notre Dame High School, and benediction by the Reverend Norman S. Kindt of the Lawrence Road Presbyterian Church.

There will be approximately 120 students graduating.

AWARDS DAY

The War Memorial Building was the setting for the Annual Awards Day. Recognition was given to those students rendering outstanding service to the Student Government and Trenton Junior College in general, for academic achievement, and for accomplishment in the field of sports. John Rafferty, a sophomore General Studies student, chaired the convocation. The program commenced with the introduction of Lloyd A. Carver, Dean of Faculty. Dean Carver read the names of the individuals who maintained a "B" average or better in all their courses and were selected to the Dean's List. He then presented the first award of the day, the Dean of Faculty Award. Miss Joan VanNoy of the General Studies Department was the recipient. In her two years at Trenton Junior College, Miss VanNoy has maintained a 2.84 cumulative average. After Dean Carver's presentation, Robert Arnott, President of the Student Council, was called upon to present the awards bestowed by the Council. John Kotkiewicz, President of Tau Gamma Alpha Fraternity, accepted the award for his organization, which was chosen the top organization at Trenton Junior College. Mr. Arnott then called Joseph Baginski, Peter Hoff, and Patricia Boenig forward to present them plaques for their untiring and conscientious service towards the Student Council and the school during the preceding school year. Robert Arnott was also chosen for this honor and Mr. Rafferty, as Vice-President of the Student Council, awarded a plaque to Arnott.

Following the Council presentations, Mr. Frank Kieser, President of Sigma Tau Sigma, came forth to read the names of the students selected to the Sigma Tau Sigma National Honor Society. To be selected for this honor a student must hold an average of "B" or above in all his social science courses. Mr. Kieser then made the Sigma Tau Sigma "Servio Hominibus" award, which was presented to Mrs. Edward Katzenbach, President of the State of New Jersey Board of Education. This award is given annually to an individual chosen from the community, who has contributed much to the community, especially in the area of education.

The Sidney B. Kalen Art Award was presented next to Miss Virginia Bryant, a member of the Art Department. This presentation was made by Mrs. Sol M. Saperstein. The award is given in memory of Ensign Sidney B. Kalen, who lost his life in service to his country during World War II.

The Ladies Auxiliary of Professional Engineers of Mercer County was given to Robert Holland of the Engineering curriculum for outstanding work in this field. The award was presented by Mrs. Wagner of the Ladies Auxiliary.

The Columban J. Sattler Memorial Prize for Literature was awarded to Miss Dorothy Straszynski for honor work in sophomore literature. Miss Straszynski was chosen on the basis of academic average and genuine interest in the art of reading as judged by the instructor of literature.

Plaques were awarded to Roy Lovesky and Paul Laden of the Trenton Junior College Newsletter staff for outstanding contributions to the publication during the past year.

Dr. John Perry Pritchett, Dean of Students, presented the Dean of Students Awards to Robert Arnott and John Rafferty. These awards are bestowed on individuals who have worked beyond their required duties in extra-curricular activities for the betterment of the college.

The President of Trenton Junior College, Dr. Henry J. Parcinski, was called to the podium to present the President's Award. The recipient was Robert Krebs, a sophomore Life Science student. This award is given to the student who has demonstrated the greatest academic improvement by living up to the confidence that the administration placed in him upon his acceptance to the institution.

Following the President, Professor Dominick A. Iorio, Director of Athletics, distributed the varsity certificates and sweaters to athletes who have earned them. Professor Iorio awarded trophies to Francis Lucash and Stephen Kubonivich for outstanding service in the field of sports. The awarding of the Intramural trophies immediately followed the varsity presentations. Farewell Message From The Editor:


