New Hire Ambassador Program

Making new employees feel welcomed

The goal is for new hires to feel welcomed, well informed and part of the communities at both the College and the Library.

The New Hire Ambassador Program matches each new employee with a more experienced employee for a period of up to six months, with two main goals: to provide the new employee with a point of contact for general questions regarding daily operational issues; and to help the new employee integrate with the College and the Library by providing access to someone who is familiar with the culture and expectations.

"We were more than excited about the New Hire Ambassador Program," said **Heather Brooks**, associate director, Office of Human Resources. "The program was created as a first step in enhancing our onboarding program for new hires. We have a long-range plan that encompasses many segments that will be introduced during the year."

The criteria to serve as an ambassador includes a strong sense of professionalism, interpersonal skills and a broad understanding of and commitment to Thomas Edison State College and the New Jersey State

Library's culture and vision. Training and guidance, which includes a checklist of items to review with the new employee, is provided to those who wish to act as an ambassador.

"The goal is for new hires to feel welcomed, well informed and part of the communities at both the College and Library," Brooks added. "We are very excited, but not surprised, that we have so many employees willing to volunteer to be ambassadors at both institutions. I am looking forward to the positive feedback and results from both new hires and long-term employees!"

Better clear the aisles because, in addition to her usual feats in the School of Business and Management, Susan Fischer may even throw in a back handspring or two. The administrative assistant by day is also a cheerleading coach who has prepared more than 2,000 novice-to-advanced cheerleaders from five to 18 years of age to compete for national titles.

"My first love was cheerleading. I was introduced to the sport when I became a cheerleader in the late 70s for Freehold Pop Warner," noted Fischer. who was also a cheerleader in the Freehold Township, N.J., public school district and, more recently, for Brookdale Community College. "I began coaching cheerleaders at the age of 16 and, by the time I was 21, served on the Freehold Pop Warner Board of Directors as cheer director." In the interim. Fischer coached children at St. Rose of Lima School in Freehold and established a cheer program for Freehold Borough Recreation. She is currently affiliated with the World Cup All Stars and competes nationally with her team, the Milkyways, who recently won four national championships and placed second in two others.

A full-time College staff member since 2005, Fischer began as a temporary employee, filling in for a staff in Human Resources on medical leave and, later, in the graduate programs area.

"Every day in my current position in the School of Business and Management is a different day," noted Fischer, who is also a member of the College's Brightest Lights committee. "One minute I am creating letters of agreement and the next I am setting up meetings and arranging travel. The daily tasks change constantly and, along the way, I have had the opportunity to work with different departments and many College staff members. I currently report to the School's Dean Dr. Susan Gilbert. and

also work with two outstanding assistant deans, Alicia Malone and Camilla King-Lewis."

"Susan Fischer has not only helped enormously in my orientation to the College, she is clearly the cheerleader in the School of Business and Management," noted Gilbert. "Susan has a lot to do

with our internal culture of morale and support – which is unequaled in my experience – and she is great at what she does."

Fischer is now channeling her inner champion to achieve a new milestone.

"I am currently earning my Thomas Edison State College degree. Years of my work life were spent at some great companies, including Six Flags Great Adventure and McGraw-Hill Companies, where I gathered very useful professional experience. My decision to return to school did not come easily, and for a time it was only a dream. However, with a little help from my family and encouragement from my friends and coworkers, it is now a reality." In spite of an often frenetic schedule, Fischer puts her family first. She and husband Michael have been married for

nine years and enjoy the beach, concerts, movies and family gatherings.

"Michael and his children, Megan and Ryan, and our granddaughter, Natalie, are my life," she said. "We spend a lot of time together, and I am very close with both my immediate and extended families. We enjoy crabbing, water parks and rollercoasters, and are avid baseball, football and college basketball fans. Baseball-wise, we are a house divided — I am a Yankees fan, my husband is a Braves fan and my stepson, Ryan, is a diehard Mets fan." The family's getaway is spent at their timeshare in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico.


College Gets Kids to Work
