Getting to Know Dennis Devery

New Acting Vice President Shares His Vision for the Division of Planning and Research

ennis W. Devery was recently named acting vice president of the Division of Planning and Research at Thomas Edison State College. He is responsible for guiding the strategic planning process as well as institutional data, research and quality assurance at the College.

Prior to joining the College, Devery served as commander of the New Jersey Army National Guard's Joint Training and Training Development Center at Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, where he led a team of training experts who provide strategic, operational and tactical instruction to U.S. military forces, state and federal law enforcement professionals and various allied military forces.

Devery, who rose to the rank of colonel in a military career that spanned 30 years, previously served as deputy director and chief of staff of the Afghan National Security Forces Development Assistance Bureau for NATO's

signments, which included New Jersey Army National Guard chief of staff, recruiting commander, state public affairs officer, aviation facility commander, supervisory instructor pilot, cavalry squadron executive officer, aviation company commander and infantry company commander.

"Dennis has led a distinguished military career serving our country and advising top military leaders," said Dr. George A. Pruitt, president of Thomas Edison State College. "He brings a unique blend of leadership and operational skills to the College and we are honored to have him on our staff."

Devery, who earned a Master of Science in Management degree from the College in 2005, detailed his vision for the Division of Planning and Research.

"I am very pleased to return to this exceptional institution and to reintegrate with the Devery also holds a BS in Management degree from Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, and a Master of Strategic Studies degree from the U.S. Army War College. He

serves as a part-time lecturer for Rutgers and is currently pursuing a doctoral degree in educational leadership from Rowan University. He has presented internationally on the subject of organizational leadership and serves as a member of the Board of Governors for the YMCA of Burlington and Camden counties.

In his spare time, Devery runs, cycles, fishes, kayaks and works out, but his favorite pastime is snow skiing. "My family and I have skied all over the world including the Alps in Germany, the Rocky Mountains out west, and the hills of Vermont and Pennsylvania." Devery is also a helicopter and airplane pilot, but admitted that he doesn't have much time to fly anymore, adding, "perhaps I will start doing that again when I retire."

After working in the Office of Military and Veteran Education for three years, Preston is ready to make her mark in the W. Cary Edwards School of Nursing.

"My responsibilities as assistant to the dean of the W. Cary Edwards School of Nursing are somewhat similar to what I was responsible for while working in Military and Veteran Education," she said. "My knowledge of the College along with the skills I had cultivated made the transition very easy."

In addition to handling all administrative matters for the dean, Preston is responsible for coordinating all quarterly nursing committee meetings, coordinating activities with other nursing staff and assisting the staff in special projects.

recounted."I spent most of my career working at the N.J. Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, a state agency that supports the N.J. Army and Air National Guard. I also grew up in the shadow of this agency since my father was in the Army National Guard and also worked for the agency for more than 35 years."

During her tenure with the agency, she served on numerous committees, including several in support of the N.I. National Guard to include bringing the USS Battleship New Jersey back to New Jersey.

Preston, who started as a clerk typist and worked her way up to executive assistant, worked for various commissioners under numerous administrations until she took a leave to raise her children.

When it was time to re-enter the workforce, Preston noted that her vast knowledge of the military and the event-planning experience she gained while working briefly for the Myelodysplastic Syndromes Foundation, gave her the qualifications necessary to secure the program assistant position in Military and Veteran Education; now she is ready for this new challenge.

"I enjoy the friendliness and compassion that the employees have, not only toward one another but toward our students." said Preston. "I really enjoy coming to work every day and interacting with such a well-educated, dedicated group of pro-



Preston holds an AAS degree in secretarial science from Mercer County Community College and has taken several business courses at Rider University toward a bachelor's degree.

"My college education was always earned on a part-time basis while working full time," she noted."I was very fortunate that I was able to re-enter the workforce with my qualifications and years of experience to make up for not having a bachelor's degree. So, since I'm always stressing to my children how important it is to have a degree, I figure it's time to start backing up what I've been preaching! In the very near future, I will become a student at Thomas Edison State College to finish what was started many years ago."

Sending a Message

How the Office of Communications spreads the word about the College

When most people think about public relations they typically think press releases and newspaper or TV coverage. But in today's cyber-intensive world, the staff of the Office of Communications is using the Internet, including the College website and social media, videos, publications and targeted outreach as well as traditional media outreach to highlight the College and its

"It's never been harder to attract traditional coverage, so we have to come up with different ways to tell our story," said Joe Guzzardo, communications director. "To do that, we are using a variety of methods to reach our key audiences." At the January Lunch and Learn, hosted by the Office of Communications, Guzzardo

highlighted the functions of the office and introduced its staff, including Karen Hume, director of Creative Services; Jeff Lushbaugh, director of Website and Multimedia Production; Chris Miller, art di-

rector; Kelly Saccomanno, communications and media outreach specialist; and Linda Soltis, communications and media outreach specialist.

The presentation focused on the diverse nature of how the office disseminates information and tells the College's story.

To better serve the College's many audiences, which include prospective and current students, alumni, supporters and staff, the Office of Communications conducts Web usability studies and surveys to

measure how well it is communicating with its key audiences.

With more than one million unique visitors annually, the College website (tesc.edu) is an integral piece of outreach. Based on student feedback, the office launched a refreshed website earlier this month. Social media is another avenue for reaching the College's audiences.

"Our social media efforts provide forums that enable students, alumni and prospective students to connect with the College and each other in the spaces where they want to engage," said Guzzardo.

In addition to its current sites on LinkedIn. Facebook, Twitter and YouTube, Guzzardo said the College has plans to start a blog and develop its newly created site on Google+.

Videos are another method the office uses to tells the College's story. The office recently revised the Admissions Video Guide, which is hosted by 2006 graduate Kristina Romero, an Emmy-nominated actress. Upcoming video projects include a student orientation, specific school-based efforts and ongoing collection of alumni testimonials captured at the College's Commencement ceremony.

Print publications continue to be another method to promote the College and stay engaged with its key audiences. In FY 2011, the College printed more than 1.3 million pieces.

Print materials typically complement targeted outreach efforts, which enable the College to present its programs to specific audiences and have been integral to successfully launching programs for educational leadership, clinical trials management, homeland security, fitness and wellness, and organizational leadership.

Special events are also tactics used to reach distinct targets. The office identifies opportunities such as conferences and information sessions and oversees the logistics. In addition to student recruitment efforts, the office has played a critical role to increase revenue and attendance of the National Institute for the Assessment of Adult Learning.

Media relations is still a core function for the office, which had a number of notable placements this year including articles in The New York Times, Military Advanced Education, Nursing Spectrum, Trenton Times and the The Press of Atlantic City.
