
Happening on Social:



Thomas Edison State University is 😉 feeling inspired.

"I was homeless for a few years - lost my wife, my kids, my family. I spent my time in and out of a wheelchair and hit rock bottom. No one understood what was wrong with me. After coming off suicide watch in Georgia, I moved back to New Jersey where I was born and had family support. Shortly thereafter, I got the counseling I needed to understand what I was going through and started to have hope again. Someone convinced me a few years ago you're not too old to get a degree, why don't you try? Halfway through my degree, I got really sick and had to withdraw from classes for a semester after being diagnosed with fullblown diabetes. The ADA coordinator came in and said "there is an ADA program here, why don't you let us introduce you to that and give you just a little extra time and take your tests at the college on paper?" And that really changed my life. I got through the program - actually, I wound up with a 3.7 grade point average which shocked me! I finally made it through my degree. Within two months, I had over 20 job offers, got hired by the VA in Philly and, within four weeks, got promoted to the VA in Newark. So it is amazing what has happened with college. I am helping others, and I love what I do so I encourage everyone today to have hope and get your degree. I am sure it will change your life just as it has changed mine!" - Robert Pelsang II, BSBA '17
