Caro Heads New Division

College Strengthens Focus on Student Services and Market Driven Academic Offerings

r. Mary Ellen Caro was recently appointed vice president for Enrollment Management and Learner Services at Thomas Edison State College.

Serving in this position, Caro now oversees the newly established Division of Enrollment Management and Learner Services, which encompasses the offices of Learner Services, Military & Veteran Education, Strategic Partnerships and the College's new recruitment and enrollment management program.

While making the announcement, **Dr. George A. Pruitt**, president of the College, said, "The creation of this new division will enable the College to better manage our continuing growth, strengthen our focus on expanding student services and develop market driven academic offerings, and better position the College for the successful implementation of our new recruitment and enrollment management strategies."

Caro joined Thomas Edison State College in 2004 after a successful career at AT&T, where she held a variety of senior executive leadership roles in operations, sales, marketing and advertising. She served as the College's first dean of the School of Business and Management, where she played a key role in enhancing the curriculum of the

School's undergraduate and graduate programs, increasing enrollment and creating the Bachelor of Science in Organizational Leadership degree program.

In 2007, Caro was named executive vice provost responsible for strategic partner-ships, corporate-higher education programs, military education, graduate studies and mentor support services. Caro has chaired many committees critical to College operations, including the Middle States Self-Study, Web, Student Conduct, and Recruitment and Enrollment Management committees.

"I am delighted to lead these critical focus areas for the College," said Caro. "Our approach to growth requires a cross functional team effort that is grounded in understanding the evolving needs of our adult learners."

Caro received a doctoral degree from the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, Pa., in higher education management. As an AT&T Sloan Fellow, Caro also received a Master of Science degree in management from Stanford University, Stanford, Calif. Other educational achievements include a Master of Science in applied statistics from Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, and a Bachelor of Arts degree in mathematics and sociology from the College of St. Elizabeth, Morristown, N.J.

Are you the type of person who would rather walk on hot coals than stand before a group and speak? Do you find yourself uncomfortable when having to give a quick response at a meeting or wish you could present your ideas better to your team or boss? Toastmasters International is a program designed to help you improve your ability to speak before groups, at meetings and even in one-on-one situations.

Since its inception in 1924, Toastmasters has grown to become a world leader in helping people become more competent and comfortable in front of an audience.

Two years ago, employees of Thomas Edison State College and the New Jersey State Library started a Toastmaster group, The State Street Speakers, which meets monthly. Participants practice and learn skills ranging from giving a prepared or impromptu speech, to serving as timer, evaluator or grammarian. There is no instructor; instead, each speech and meeting is critiqued by a fellow member in a positive manner, focusing on what was done right and what could be improved.

Focus On: Frank Tulli


The word "I" never enters the conversation when Frank Tulli describes his position in Mail Operations in the Office of Administrative Services.

For him, success is a shared endeavor.

"It takes a collective effort by all members of the Mail Operations staff," noted Tulli, when asked about the details of his

position. "The day begins for us by picking up the College's mail from the local post office, sorting it and then delivering it to the respective departments in three buildings. There are two mail deliveries: one at 10 a.m. and another at 2 p.m. The outgoing mail is then collected from the College departments, sorted, metered and delivered to the post office by 4 p.m."

Though mail opera-



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tions is the underlying objective, Tulli, a clerk driver employed at the College for 12 years, points out that many of his duties defy category.

"Our staff set up the College's various conference spaces on a daily basis and assist the College's guests and staff with technical equipment and facility issues," he explained. "We also provide support to the Office of Admissions in the Fulfillment Center, packing the materials needed for delivery to prospective and admitted students." In addition to day-today facilities management and logistic needs, he and his colleagues serve as an integral resource during Commencement and the College's special events.

Tulli has firsthand knowledge of the difference between adult learners and traditional students, as his 25 years of experience in a residential campus setting can attest.

During his tenure as a campus police officer at a nearby residential state college, he was responsible for the safety and security of the campus while protecting students, visitors, faculty, administrative

staff, dormitories and property. The three months of training with the New Jersey State Policy Academy in Sea Girt prepared him in crime scene protocol, coordination of emergency services and as a first responder for criminal complaints. assaults, injuries, vehicular violations and dispute mediation while working in tandem with college administrators, local law enforcement and the court systems. The

> position culminated in Tulli being promoted to the rank of lieutenant.

Prior to his role as a campus police officer, Tulli served six years with the New Jersey National Guard and completed advanced training at Fort Jackson in South Carolina. "My training at Jackson consisted mostly of learning to be a supply clerk the 'army way," he added.

As a lifelong learner, Tulli spent two years at Mercer County

Community College (MCCC). Ironically, one of his courses was taken on the Kelsey Building's 5th floor during MCCC's occupation of 101 West State Street. He has also held a N.J. real estate

Tulli has worked under many conditions with an array of personalities leading up to his present position; but to him, Thomas Edison State College remains unique.

"What I like most about working here are the people! I spend my days with the best group of co-workers I have encountered anywhere," he added.

"Frank Tulli is a genuine team player who is an asset to the Office of Administrative Services and the entire College," said Mary Hack, director of Administrative Services. "He is our 'go to' guy, but it is his reliability during the crunch times that I admire the most."

Tulli and wife Kathleen (soon to be emptynesters) have spent 40 years in Hamilton Township, Mercer County, where they have raised their four children.


