
Your values should be your guideline to success, regardless of how the results may differ from the stated definitions. You should make the decisions and be the judge.


"EASTERN REGIONAL CHAMPS"



The boy with all the shots and with the ability to jump with the tallest, Carl also made the Region XV team but only played 23 regular games because of a bad back injury.
















The result of the meets was 0 wins and 4 losses.

Plans are already being mapped out to make the next season a winning one here at TJC.

Newcomers Steve McGuires, Don Lohin, Leon Williams, and Pete Dimitri, along with many others, spurred the coach's hopes for a successful season. However, George Mickolas, his ace pitcher, was the only starting pitcher who showed promise.

The team hopes to make up in the hitting department what it is lacking in pitching. With some consistent fielding, the team should bring home a better than .500 record and hopes to receive a bid to the Regional Tournament and, if it is as lucky as the soccer and basketball teams, a bid to the National Tournament in Colorado.
