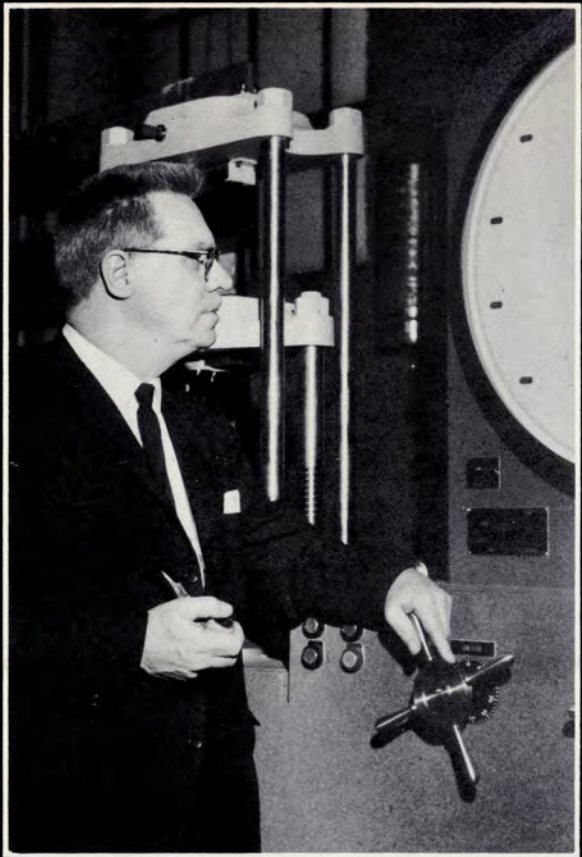
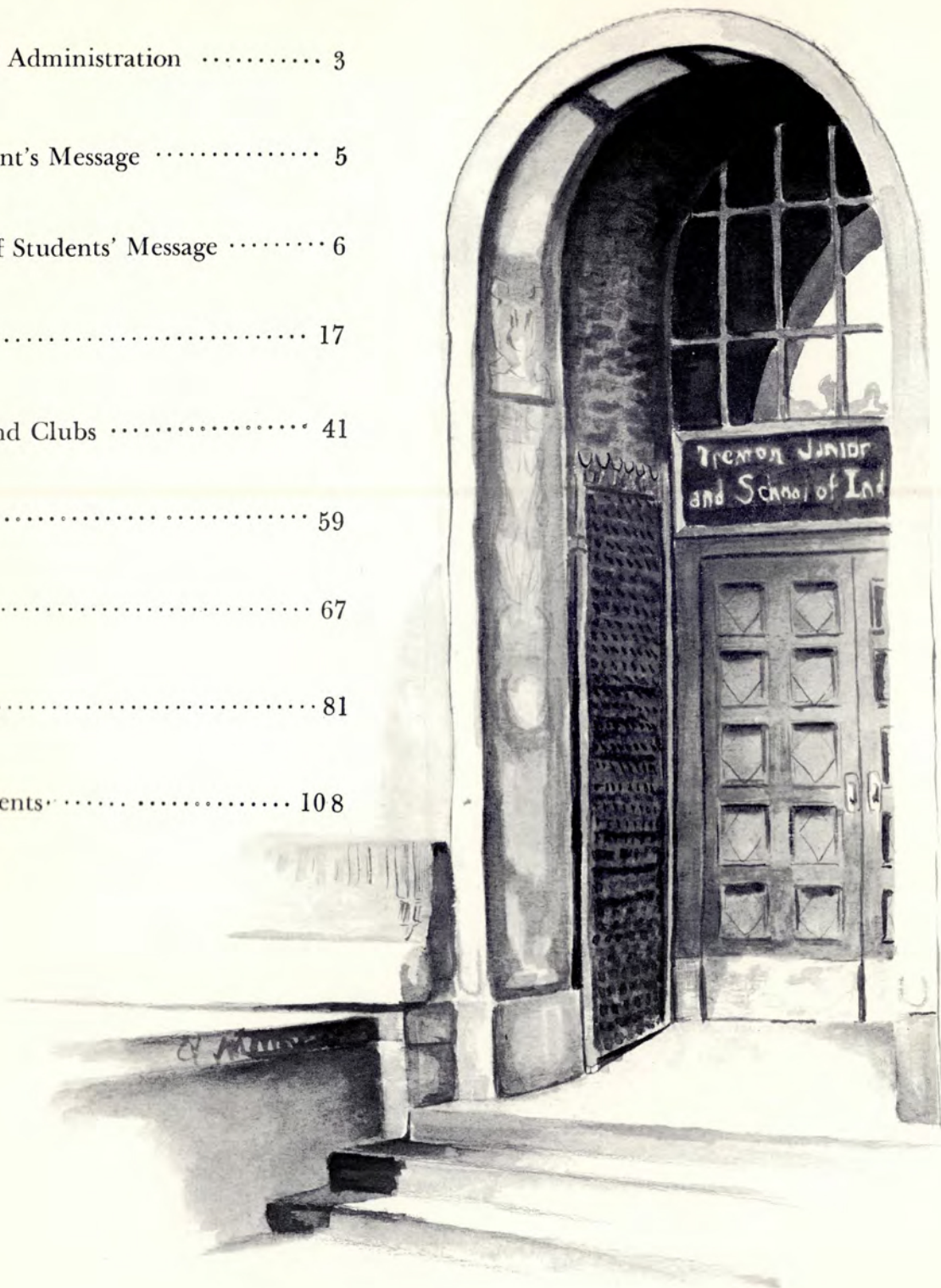

Your values should be your guideline to success, regardless of how the results may differ from the stated definitions. *You* should make the decisions and be the judge.

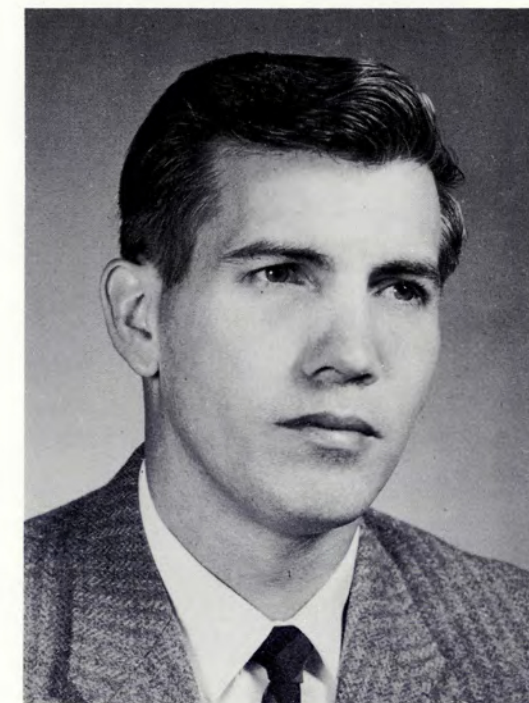

The soccer team's first year in intercollegiate soccer proved to be an outstanding success and Coach Dlugosz is looking forward to many years of continuing success.



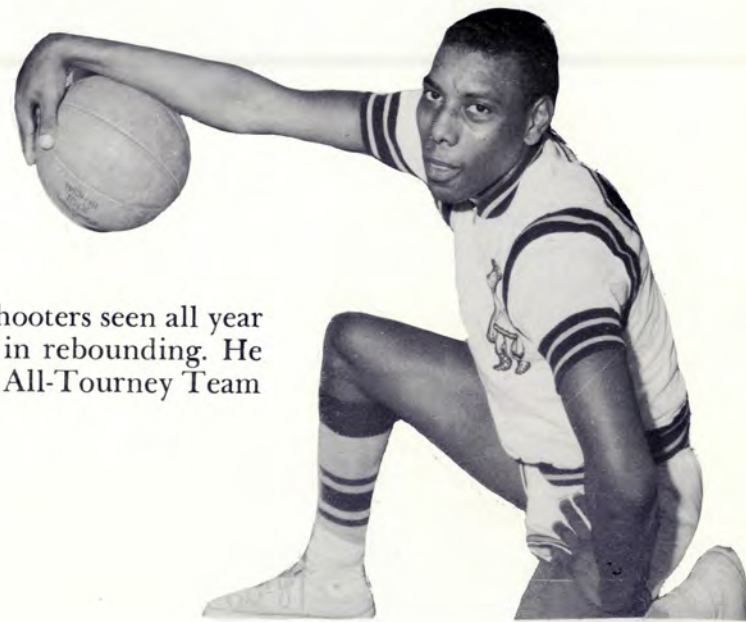


## "EASTERN REGIONAL CHAMPS"

The boy with all the shots and with the ability to jump with the tallest, Carl also made the Region XV team but only played 23 regular games because of a bad back injury.

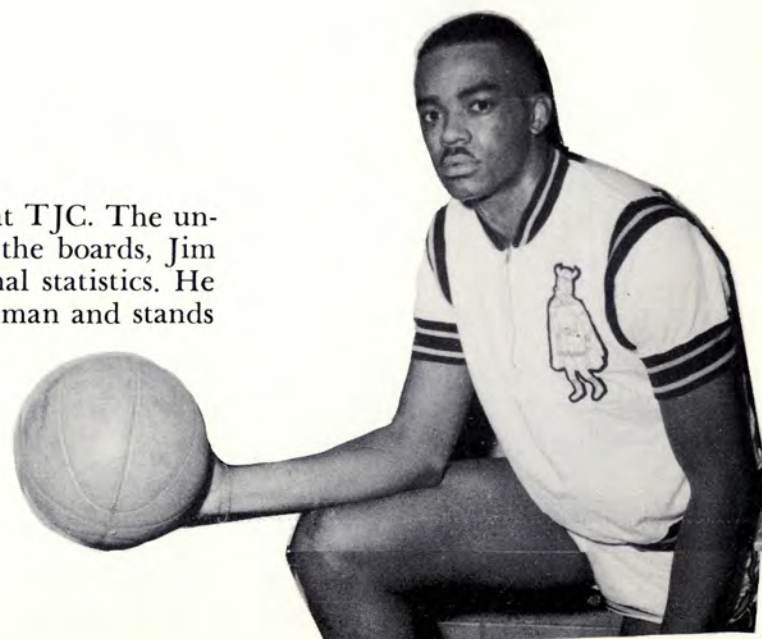

Plans are already being mapped out to make the next season a winning one here at TJC.
