College Mourns the Loss of Dr. Christine Rosner

Thomas Edison State College mourns the loss of Christine M. Rosner, RN,

PhD, associate dean for Undergraduate Programs in the W. Cary Edwards School of Nursing, who died suddenly in her sleep on Monday, Aug. 11. She was 57.

A resident of Dresher, Pa., Rosner joined the College in October 2012. She was responsible for the School's

Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) programs, including the RN-BSN and Accelerated 2nd Degree BSN programs, and played an integral role in designing the new nursing simulation laboratory. Prior to joining the College, Rosner served as dean of the School of Nursing and Allied Health Professions at Holy Family University, where she also served as a professor.

"Christine loved working at the College," recalled **Dr. Filomela** Marshall, dean of the W. Cary Edwards School of Nursing. "She was an extraordinary talent and a wonderful part of the College's nursing family. She truly had a passion for undergraduate nursing education. This is a tremendous and devastating loss. We will miss her dearly."

Rosner received her BSN from Gwynedd-Mercy College, a master's degree in nursing of children from the University of Pennsylvania and a PhD in nursing research and theory development from New York University.

She is survived by her husband, Gary, and their children, Sarah and Andrew.

Respiratory Therapy Program Graduates Also Earn Thomas Edison State College Associate Degree

Thomas Edison State College's Dr. Terri Tallon, director of Military Student Services, and Cathy Punchello, registrar, attended the Interservice Respiratory Therapy Program (IRTP) graduation ceremony at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, on Aug. 22.

Graduates of the IRTP receive an Associate in Applied Science (AAS) degree in respiratory care from Thomas Edison State College. Students endure a challenging didactic curriculum that includes 640 hours of intense respiratory anatomy and physiology, medical gas therapy, airway management, pulmonary function studies, mechanical ventilation and pulmonary pathophysiology.

Upon completion of the academic portion, students are immersed in an intense clinical setting at the San Antonio Military Medical Center, the Institute of Surgical Research and other local medical facilities, where they perform respiratory therapy procedures in all facets of adult and neonatal intensive care units, medical and surgical wards, and pulmonary function testing.

Tallon and Punchello also spent an intense two days touring the medical facilities, meeting with the Medical Education and Training Campus (METC) registrar, and visiting students and instructors of the program.
