At October's Lunch and Learn, attendees were given an inside look into the consistent positive progress the Foundation has made during the last five years, and its vision, detailed in its new strategic plan, for the years to come.

and broke ground for the Nursing Education Center, the Foundation provided record levels of financial support for scholarships and new academic programs."

Misty Isak, director of Development, noted key numbers and figures that help to support and showcase the continued success of the Foundation. With this year's golf outing at Jasna Polana in Princeton this past May, the Foundation raised more than \$66,500, which made it the most successful golf outing to date. Not to be outdone, the Foundation's Gala, held at the Hyatt Regency Princeton in October, generated more than \$171,000, also the most successful gala to date.

Not only does the Foundation raise funds to promote the College's mission and help achieve its goals, but it also gives back to the College in the form of grants and scholarships. This year alone, the Foundation submitted 30 grant proposals for funding to support College programs and has had an impressive 83 percent success rate thus far. Having already received grants this year from organizations such as Helene Fuld Health Trust and PSEG, the Foundation continues to track the status of additional major grant proposals to round out the calendar year, for amounts which exceed \$800,000. The funds granted to the Foundation are dispersed strategically to the College as specific needs arise. One such need is the increased number of scholarships being offered to students that are, in part, funded by the Foundation. For the year 2014 alone, the Foundation has funded 90 scholarships, 51 more scholarships than were awarded in 2013.

# Test-Drive an Online Course

# The Office of Admissions announces the roll-out of the online test-drive course

The new online test-drive course was born from an idea crafted by **Jasmine Lynch**, senior admissions counselor. Lynch saw a need for a free online course that anyone, prospective and newly enrolled students alike, could take as a way to experience online courses through the College.

There is no cost to test drive the course, which is self-paced and features brief videos that guide participants through the course and reviews all of the key actions that take place in an online course at Thomas Edison State College. Registration is quick and easy and, once enrolled; the course is available for 30 days.

"Many of our students have been removed from college for at least 10 years and are hesitant to return to higher education. Factor in technology, and the idea of returning seems even more daunting," Lynch explained. "Sharing my own experience with online course work has helped put some prospective students at ease prior to enrollment, but there were others who wanted to actually experience it for themselves."

After learning that the College would be using Moodle, Lynch immediately researched what the new learning platform had to offer in that area. "Moodle allows for more flexibility in course development and reduces cost. I saw no better time than the present to create a free test-drive course."

Lynch noted that the Center for Learning and Technology did an excellent job bringing this course to life, and that she looks forward to seeing the positive effect it will have on student enrollment.
