# Focus On: Jaime Helmuth

When she was five years old. Jaime Helmuth took up dancing, following in older sister Michelle's footsteps. "I had to do everything she did," Helmuth began. "Before I knew it, here I am with 25 years of dance experience under my belt."

Over the years, Helmuth dabbled in almost every style of dance there is: ballet, tap, jazz, hip-hop, with tap being her unequivocal favorite. However, in recent years, Helmuth has put dancing on hold.

She found herself at Thomas Edison State College (TESC) by way of a temporary job opening in Office of Administrative Services (now Office of Facilities and Operations) in December 2007. "I owned a tanning salon at the time and was getting ready to close. I wasn't sure what I was going to do next when an opportunity arose with the College and I got the job." Admittedly, Helmuth wasn't sure what to expect, but notes, "it was one of the best decisions I ever made."

Seven and a half years later, now the program assistant in the Office of the Controller, she has risen through the ranks on the financial side of the institution having served as a clerk typist, senior clerk typist, principal clerk typist and secretarial assistant 3. "The controller's office is a great office. The people I work with are what I enjoy the most about my position; they make coming to work easy every morning."

Helmuth's duties range from reviewing and inputting all new vendors, checking the Internal Revenue Service's (IRS) website to be sure accurate information is retained. to opening and distributing all mail and correspondence for the office. "I void and reissue all outstanding checks, prepare tax exempt and W-9 forms for anyone across the College that requests them, and further submit W-9's to Pay Mode, the College's accounting software system, when vendors sign on for direct deposit."

Scholastically, Helmuth is currently in pursuit of her TESC Associate in Science in Business Administration degree, with five courses remaining; she plans to move on to earn her Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree almost immediately afterward.

"I think it's great that we can work at the College and continue to pursue our education. I couldn't afford to put myself through college so I was never able to obtain my degree; now, working here, I am able to do that."

When she's not hitting the books, Helmuth makes time to stay involved in the world of dance. She volunteers with the Glen Roc Dance Shoppe in Ewing, assisting with two classes with dancers that range in age from 3 to 5 years old. "I make sure all their costumes are on correctly and that their



hair and makeup are done the proper way." Additionally, she brings them on stage and places them into their assigned spots in time for their dance to begin. "When their dance is over, I make sure they're back in their dressing rooms and stay with them for the whole show. It's important to keep them entertained."

While Helmuth has taken a hiatus from dancing, there's no quarantee she won't return to the studio. "While I don't dance any longer, I may take classes again in the next few years. I would love to go back for the exercise and love of dancing."

Helmuth and her fiancé, Jim, live in Ewing Township, with their 1-year-old son, Anthony, and part time with Jim's two sons, Jimmy, 10, and Kyle, 5.
