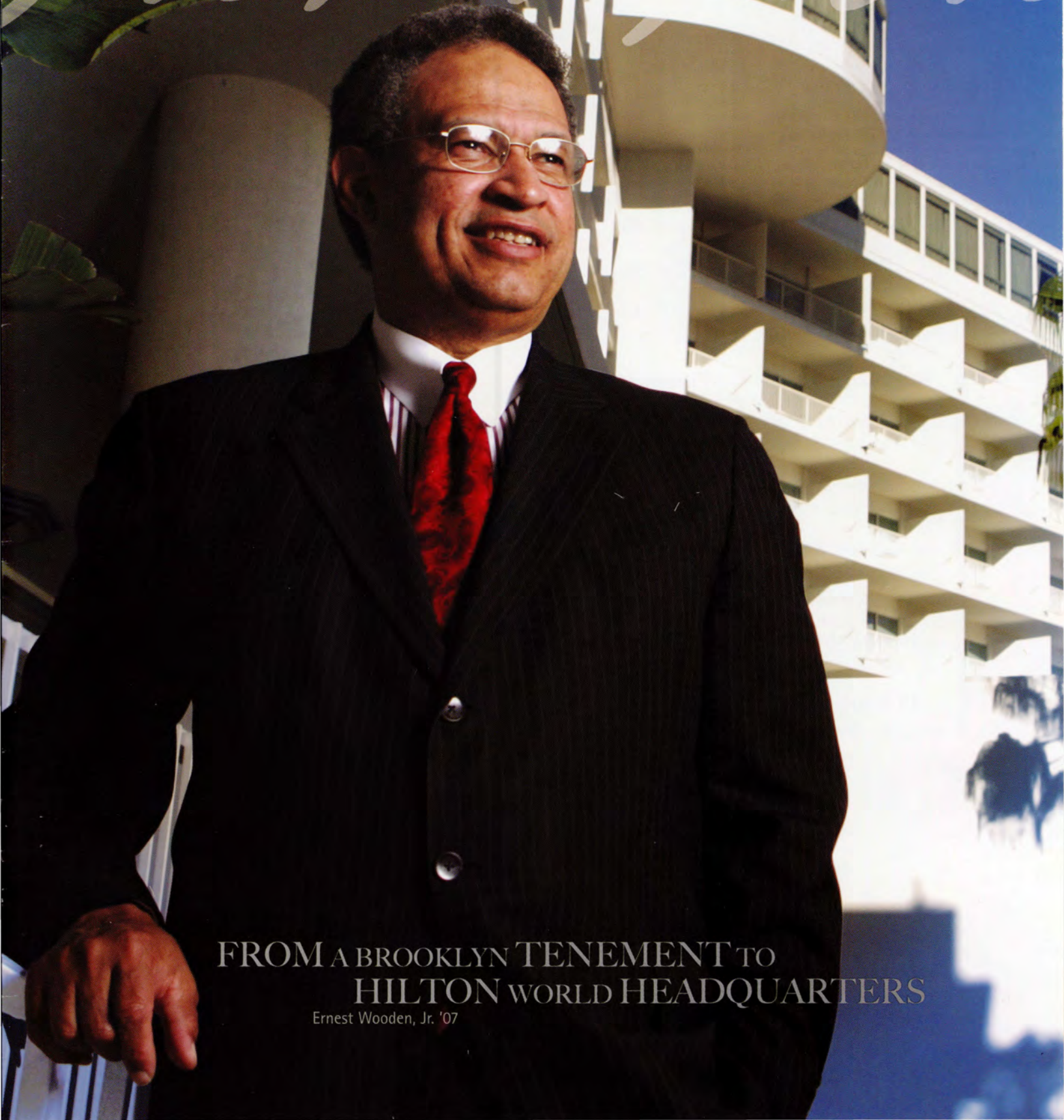

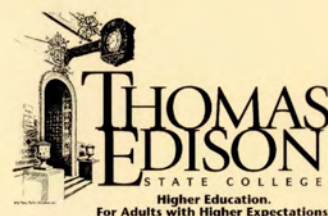
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Dear Alumni, Students and Friends,

FINDING PURPOSE

How Thomas Edison State College Helped a Successful PR Man Find a More Fulfilling Career

Michael Cestero was faced with a challenge: he was a successful public relations professional whose career left him unfulfilled.

He was also haunted by the fact that he never finished his college education – something his mother always had wanted him to do.

"Both of my parents were college graduates, and I knew that it was a hole in my mother's heart that her baby boy never graduated from college," lamented Cestero. "That ate at me."

Cestero initially entered college in 1982, after graduating from Manalapan High School in New Jersey, but he was not ready for the dedication required to earn a college degree.

"I took up time and space," he recalled. "Like many young people, I enjoyed the social scene but I was immature and ended up dropping out after just a few years."

Despite his educational setback, Cestero found success

in public relations. He worked for two national organizations that focused on, ironically, continuing education.

Cestero worked for Computer Learning Center in Chicago and Philadelphia, where he initiated publicity and spoke with high school students throughout the country about opportunities in the field of computers. Before that, he was a public relations representative for Lincoln Technical Institute in New Jersey and Chicago.

Although he developed a successful career, Cestero always regretted his decision to drop out of college. It was his mother who inspired him to go back to school.

"She had graduated from college in the 1940s, when most women were homemakers," said Cestero. "She was a trend setter, and an inspiration for me to go back."

After a 16-year hiatus, Cestero started to research accredited colleges.

"While surveying the field of prospects, it became clear that Thomas Edison State College would be my choice

because of its stellar reputation and the flexibility it provided for career adults like me," he said.

Cestero said he was nervous about returning to college and how he would manage both his course work and his career at the same time.

"Although I knew I now had the maturity and discipline to achieve this goal, I did have my doubts," he said. "But, the staff, educators and academic advisors at the college were extremely supportive and available to assist me in every capacity."

In 2003, his hard work paid off. Cestero completed his Bachelor of Arts degree and earned an Arnold Fletcher Award for exemplary academic achievement. He remembers gazing into the audience in the Patriots Theater at The War Memorial in Trenton, N.J., and seeing tears in his mother's eyes.

"If I live to be a hundred, I will always remember how proud she was at that moment," Cestero reminisced. "That achievement came not a moment too soon, as my beloved mother tragically and unexpectedly died shortly thereafter. I am glad that the timing was such that my mother was in the audience to be able to realize our dream together."

Earning his college degree was not the only change in his life. Cestero was also thinking about how to find a more rewarding vocation.

"In my career, my wallet was full but my heart had become empty," he said. "I needed that to change as I approached my 40th birthday."

He researched human services agencies and found the perfect match in Allies, Inc., a Mercer County-based nonprofit organization that supports individuals with disabilities throughout New Jersey.

Cestero joined Allies, Inc., in 2003 and today works as a transition counselor working with high school kids who have developmental disorders, such as cerebral palsy, Down syndrome, Williams syndrome, and autism spectrum disorders, such as Asperger's syndrome.

As a transition counselor, Cestero helps kids develop employment and life skills and prepare for the world outside of high school.

"In other careers, I've made more money, but after working for Allies, Inc., I've never been compensated more in my life," said Cestero. "Just to see my kids getting jobs, working hard and being part of the community is priceless. Their self esteem skyrockets knowing that they are really just like everybody else in this world. It is truly a beautiful thing."

Clearly, his passion shows in his work. Cestero was named the 2007 Transition Educator of the Year by the New Jersey APSE (Association for Persons in Supported Employment), a supportive employment network for people with disabilities throughout New Jersey.

"I owe a lot of my success over the past several years to Thomas Edison State College," he said. "I would not have been offered the position with Allies, Inc. if I did not have that degree."

Cestero lives with his wife of 12 years, Toni, in Bucks County, Pa.

The 35th ANNUAL Commencement

Amy Florence knows all about persistence.

In an age of expecting virtually everything to happen quickly, Florence, of Princeton, N.J., is living proof that you are never too old to pursue your dreams and that you never stop learning.

"It has taken me almost 46 years to understand what I am to be, but now I feel that I am at the polishing stage," said Florence, who is currently pursuing a dual master's degree in divinity and social work at Princeton Theological Seminary.

She notes that she is completely comfortable with the idea that her objectives were reached in small increments.

"There was never an 'Aha!' moment in my decision to attend seminary," she said. "The realization was revealed to me piece-by-piece. I was born in a generation whose mothers mostly stayed home to care for their children. I married on my 19th birthday and, in the years immediately following, had three daughters."

Later, after serving as a homeroom mom, Girl Scout leader, and fronting a family business in which she designed horse racing silks for jockeys, Florence eventually worked full time as an administrative assistant. This year, she completed her Bachelor of Arts degree in psychology from Thomas Edison State College.

She said she expects to benefit from the knowledge she obtained from earning her degree and the

determination she has developed along the way.

"I have life experience that is impossible to learn from a book," said Florence. "I am using the dedication and determination that I acquired while pursuing my BA and it has made all the difference in the world!"

Florence received her diploma on Oct. 6 during the College's 35th Annual Commencement at The War Memorial in Trenton. She was joined by approximately 350 fellow graduates who attended the ceremony, including some who came from as far away as Italy, Hawaii, California, Texas and Canada.

Dr. George A. Pruitt, president of Thomas Edison State College, told the graduates that the spirit of the College and its namesake will stay with them long after Commencement has ended.

"Wherever you go, the College will go with you. Wherever you work, the College will work with you," he said. "We are extremely proud of

your accomplishments and welcome you as alumni of Thomas Edison State College."

Two individuals addressed graduates at the event.

Ernest Wooden Jr., MSM '07, gave the response for the graduates. Wooden, who is executive vice president of Global Brands for Hilton Hotels Corporation, said he is proud to be part of a community of learners committed to self-excellence and managing their personal and professional responsibilities.

"Meeting many of you online was

incredibly encouraging," he said. "A grandmother from Texas, a Marine in Iraq, fighting during the day and doing his homework at night – all incredibly powerful stories of focus and will."

Dr. Pamela Tate, president and CEO of the Council for Adult Experiential Learning (CAEL), received an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters. She told the graduates she has long admired Thomas Edison State College and reminded them that their education enables them to make a difference in the world.

"The world needs people like you, who have stretched and struggled," she said. "You have reached an important milestone, but you cannot stop here. Please remain an active and committed learner. Your willingness to keep learning will give you the power to change the world. The future is not predicted."

ERNEST WOODEN JR. PROVES IT'S NOT
THE CARDS YOU'RE DEALT THAT MATTER,
BUT HOW YOU PLAY THE HAND

His moment of clarity came during a family vacation in Martha's Vineyard and was inspired by a rock lying in a dusty corner of a gift shop.

Even though Ernest Wooden Jr. had already achieved professional success as a top executive at one of the world's most renowned hotel companies, finding that rock helped him answer a question he had been struggling with for years.

It was inscribed with the following words: "It's not the cards you're dealt that matter, it's how you play the hand."



For Wooden, life's purpose finally found a foothold.

"The vagaries surrounding my own drive and motivation suddenly became clear as I held the rock," said Wooden, during his Response to Graduates address at the College's Commencement in October. "It was a treasure in plain sight. Ironically, we've all witnessed people who have been dealt a 'royal flush.' People who have caring parents, financial wherewithal, good looks, health, privilege – all the ingredients for success – yet tragically squander their potential."

If you never met Wooden, executive vice president of Global Brands for Hilton Hotels Corporation, you might think it peculiar that such a transformative event occurred after a steady rise through the corporate ranks of some of the most distinguished

hotels, including Sheraton, DoubleTree, Omni and Hilton.

But those who know him understand that he is passionate about education and lifelong learning.

A man with an unwavering eye toward self-improvement, Wooden was originally dealt an astonishingly poor hand of cards. The son of a single mother, he grew up in Brooklyn's hardscrabble Bedford-Stuyvesant tenements, where he recalled snow actually falling *inside* the hallways where he and his four siblings roamed.

"We had to boil the water we used to wash up for school in the morning," he said. "I grew up in an extremely disadvantaged neighborhood where just getting to school was perilous."

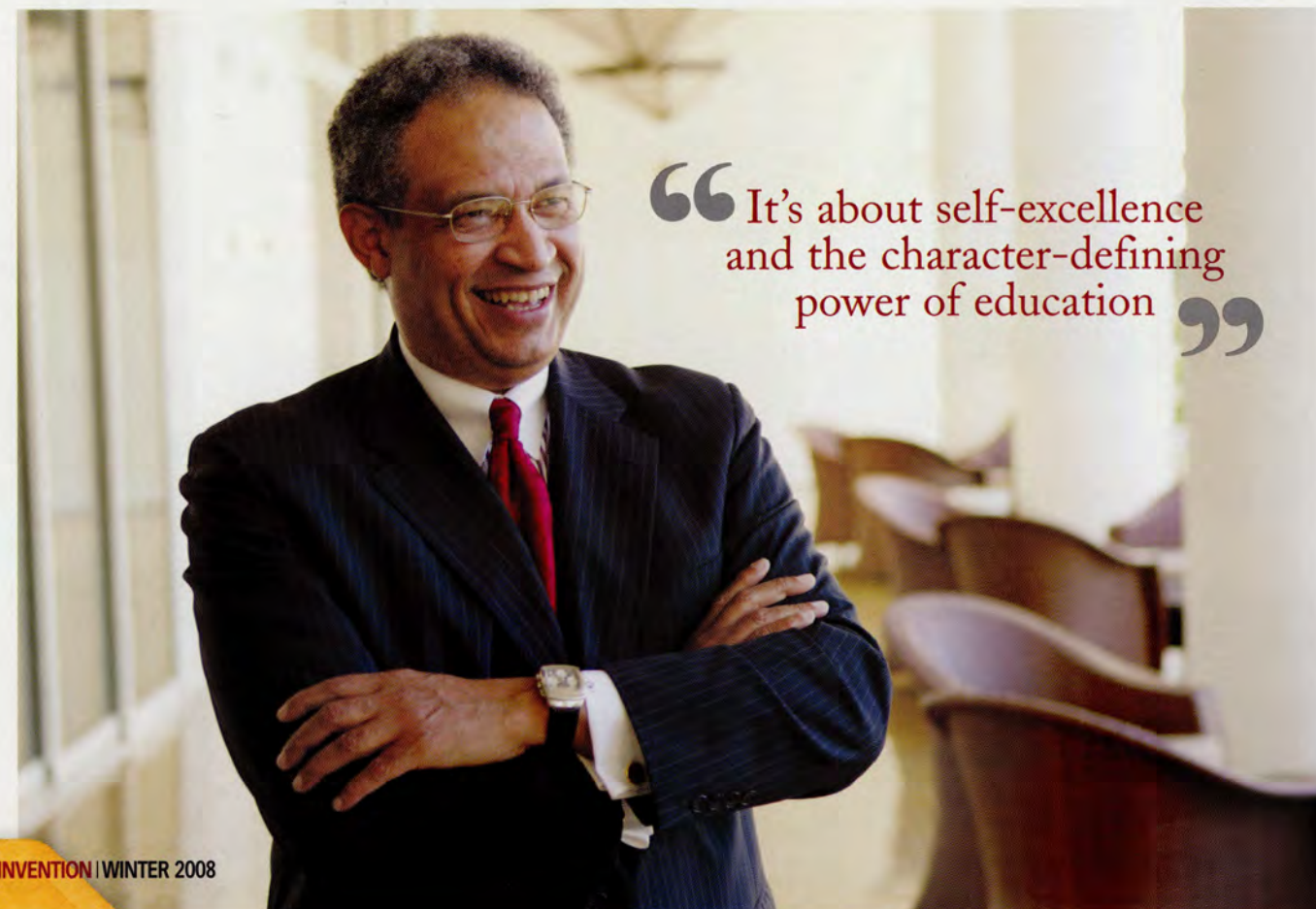
Today, Wooden sees little indication of winter's blight in his office at

Hilton's Beverly Hills headquarters – though the daily pressures on him are equally daunting.

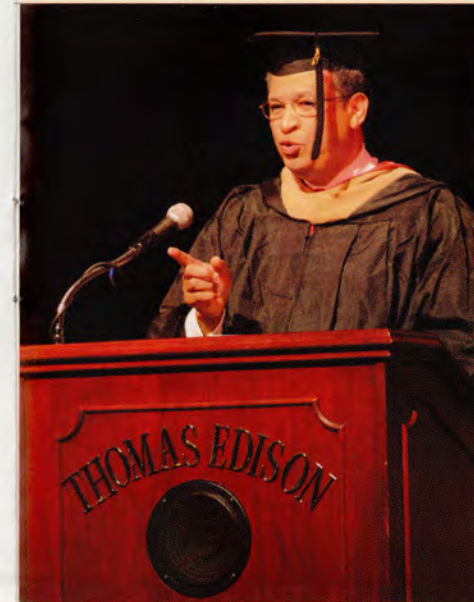
Wooden is charged with global advancement of Hilton's full complement of brands – Hilton®; Conrad®; DoubleTree®; Embassy Suites®; Hampton Inn®, Hampton Inn & Suites®; Hilton Garden Inn®; Hilton Grand Vacations™; Homewood Suites®, and the Waldorf=Astoria Collection®.

In this capacity, he is responsible for the branding vitality of nearly 3,000 properties in 80 countries, revenues in excess of \$8.2 billion, and oversees 30 senior vice presidents and vice presidents, along with the venerable Hilton Honors Program®.

Why would someone with such a successful and challenging career want to continue their education?

"It's about self-excellence and the character-defining power of education," explained Wooden. "I'm always suspicious about what I don't know, and try to set an example of enthusiasm for learning for my children and my colleagues."

Wooden added that it is about developing an appreciation for and an understanding of life.

"Unfortunately, many people open the newspaper to read that inflation is on the rise, but they lack the capacity to fully understand why," he said. "A better understanding of the 'mechanism' affords people a valuable grasp of the world in which they operate."

The mechanism that Wooden selected to continue his education was the variety of course methods available at Thomas Edison State College.

"It was the most flexible learning environment I had ever come in contact with," said Wooden, who earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree in hotel management in 2006 and a Master of Science in Management degree in 2007. He is now pursuing a doctorate degree from the

International School of Business in Paris, France.

Despite being a frequent corporate traveler, Wooden remains an eager explorer. His wife, Annice, helped him develop an appreciation for art and museums, which has enabled Wooden to find something fascinating in every place he visits.

Dr. John Mellon, one of Wooden's mentors at Thomas Edison State College, said Wooden's point of view is refreshing, especially in a corporate setting.

"It's impossible to overstate the wisdom and intelligence of Ernest Wooden in the industry," he said. "This is a man who briefed former owner of the Beverly Hilton, Merv Griffin, during lunch, but is completely modest about what he's achieved."

The softening in Wooden's voice, however, reveals the people who he is truly in awe of – his family. He describes his primary job as husband, father and grandfather.

Wooden's eldest daughter, Marlowe, is completing her nursing degree at the City University of New York; his second daughter, Lauren, holds an undergraduate degree in elementary

education, and will soon complete her master's degree in sign language; his son, Ernest, is a graduate of the American Music and Dramatic Academy in New York; and his youngest daughter, Gabrielle, will embark on her baccalaureate degree in September. In addition, Annice earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in English from Thomas Edison State College and is now completing a master's degree in fine arts.

Wooden said he is honored to be part of a school whose graduates refuse to be "victims" of difficult and inconvenient circumstances.

"Thomas Edison State College has defined the educational setting more broadly than tradition has allowed," he said. "The College has provided a framework which encourages motivated adults of all stripes to grow in their understanding of the world."

Thomas Edison State College Foundation Celebrates College's 35th Anniversary

The Thomas Edison State College Foundation hosted The Grande Ball – 2007 at the Hyatt Regency in Princeton, N.J., on Saturday, Oct. 27, which attracted more than 270 guests and raised approximately \$113,000.

The black-tie gala event began with a silent auction and cocktails followed by an evening of dinner, dancing and entertainment. Highlighting the evening was the presentation of the 14th Annual Spirit of Edison Awards. Ida Hammond, AA '77, BA '79, past chair of the College's Board of Trustees, received the Spirit of Edison Distinguished Alumna Award, and former New Jersey Senator Peter Inverso, president and CEO of Roma Bank, received the Spirit of Edison Community Leader Award.

The Spirit of Edison awards recognize community leaders and alumni whose creativity, commitment and entrepreneurial spirit reflect the pioneering genius of Thomas Alva Edison.

Dr. George A. Pruitt, president of Thomas Edison State College, said this year's recipients embody the commitment

to innovation, concern for public good and the spirit of excellence associated with the mission of Thomas Edison State College and the inventor it is named after.

"Ida's excellent record of service to our College and to the community makes her an outstanding candidate for the Spirit of Edison Award," said Dr. Pruitt. "Under her leadership as chair of our Board of Trustees, Thomas Edison State College experienced extraordinary enrollment growth."

Dr. Pruitt said Inverso's track record as a state legislator and corporate leader has always benefited higher education in New Jersey. "Peter's unwavering commitment to community service and leadership makes him an ideal recipient of the Spirit of Edison Award," he said.

Peter A. Inverso Ida Hammond '77 & '79

Peter A. Inverso served in the New Jersey Senate representing the 14th Legislative District, covering parts of Mercer and Middlesex counties from 1991 - 2008, and serves as president and CEO of Roma Federal Savings Bank, based in Robbinsville, N.J.

Inverso was first elected to the New Jersey State Senate in 1991. During his senatorial career, he was the primary sponsor of several pieces of major legislation that are now state law, including: "Megan's Law"; the Megan's Law Internet Notification Amendment; "The Fair Credit Reporting Act", which entitles consumers to receive one free credit report per year; and the "Victim's Impact Statement", which gives family members of a murder victim the right to enter a statement during the sentencing phase of murder trials. Prior to his election to the state Senate, Inverso served two terms as a Mercer County Freeholder, where he served on various boards and commissions.

Under Inverso's leadership, Roma Bank has expanded its operations and currently serves customers in Mercer, Burlington and Ocean counties and remains dedicated to its mission of providing superior financial services in a personal and professional manner to its customers and communities.

Inverso is a certified public accountant and graduate of Rider University. He holds an Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree from The College of New Jersey.

Inverso is vice chairman of the Robert Wood Johnson Health Care Corporation at Hamilton and has served as chairman of the Board of Trustees of Robert Wood Johnson Hospital Hamilton. He is a trustee of Project Freedom, which provides housing and assistance for people with disabilities, and a board member of Angel's Wings. He is a member of the New Jersey State Museum Board of Trustees and the New Jersey Commerce and Economic Growth Commission.

Inverso resides in Hamilton Township with his wife, Geri. They have five children and two grandchildren.

Ida Hammond can tell you all about lifelong learning.

As a parent, an education professional and a literacy advocate, she has worked for more than 40 years to enhance education for children and adults and has witnessed the benefits of higher learning first-hand.

She applied to the College in the early 1970s, when it was located in a storefront on North Olden Avenue in Ewing Township, N.J. Hammond, who was working and raising two children at the time, always understood that education provides opportunities for promotion and professional growth.

While she pursued her degree at Thomas Edison State College, Hammond served as a student representative on the College's Academic Council. During this time, Hammond's daughter was also attending college and her son was in elementary school.

In 1977, Hammond earned her Associate of Arts degree and two years later, received her Bachelor of Arts degree. Soon after that, she began to rise through the ranks at the New Jersey Department of Education before retiring in 1992.

Hammond also became an active alumna, serving two terms as president of the Alumni Association. She also served as an alumni representative on the College Foundation Board of Directors.

She is the 1994 recipient of the College's Thomas C. Streckewald Service Award. Since 1972, Hammond has served as a tutor with the Volunteers of America Adult Literacy Program and has been a volunteer with Bookmates, a program that promotes reading to elementary school students. Today, she remains an active member of the Friends of the Library programs in Westhampton and Willingboro and People to People International.

Hammond was appointed to the College's Board of Trustees in 1995. In 2005, she was named chair of that board and served in that capacity for two years. During her tenure as chair, the College expanded its academic program and its enrollment.
